PRIZES AWARDED.

The contests in the girl's indoor pentathlon, which could not be awarded that night, because of the stopping of the matches, were finally presented to the winners last Friday, when the contests in doubt were run once again. As a result of this, Miss Alburta Spurek is wearing the gold medal, awarded to the winner of the pentathlon by Miller and Paine. She scored a total of 390 points. Miss Ida Taylor won the silver medal, presented by A. E. Spurek, with a score of 349, while Miss Eleanor Miller had only ten points less and easily won the bronze medal. It might be said in this connection that the report that Miss Miller gave out in the potato race is utterly baseless. Quite the contrary. She ran more potatoes than any of her competitors and made the best time that evening.

Among the first year girls, Miss Guile carried off the honors, rolling up a total of 314 points, thereby securing a pair of fencing foils presented by FitzGerald and Co. The second prize, a tennis racket, from H. W. Brown, was won by Miss Dorington, with a total of 249 points, while a pair of Indian clubs, presented by C. W. Leighton, went to Miss Meserve, who had 229 points to her credit.

NEBRASKA BEATS WASHBURN.

Our baseball team celebrated their return from their southern trip and incidentally inaugurated their new suits by defeating Washburn college by the score of 12 to 10. The visitors proved no match for our team, who could have run up a much larger score were they not anxious to save themselves for the Missouri game on the next day. The game abounded in errors, both sides getting their share. The work of both pitchers was good, despite the number of hits made, Bliss having much the best of it. The features of the game were Reeder's two catches of flies in the seventh and Rhoades' pretty stop and put-out on first in the same inning, and Robinson's catch of Cowgill's fly in the eighth.

Stahl opened up for the visitors by gaining first on a hit to Reeder that was fielded too slowly. Stahl was cut off at second on Gephard's grounder. Baxter flew out to Rhea and Barnes struck out. Nebraska started their run-getting in the first. After Reeder's out, Moore got first on Gephard's error, stole second and came home on Bliss' hit. Kindler and Cowgill went out at first. Washburn went out in one, two, three order, but Nebraska added two more runs to their score. After Johnson's out, Rhea goes to second on a hit to right, goes to third on Liebman's hit and Rhoades brings both home. Reeder strikes out and Rhoades is caught at the plate on Moore's grounder.

In the third the visitors begin their scoring. Irelan hits to left field. Robinson is given his base on balls. Stahl strikes out. Irelan and Robinson advance a base on Cowgill's error. Gephard brings Irelan in. Baxter is hit by the pitcher. Barnes fans and then Kennedy's hit brings in Robinson. Stahl strikes out.

Nebraska comes right back at them in their half and piles up three more runs. Bliss is hit and gets to first, steals second, advances to third on an error and scores on a passed ball. Kindler follows on Robinson's error. Johnson brings in the third run.

In the fourth Frisby gets first on a wild throw by Bliss. Irelan's hit sends him to second. Both advance a base on Robinson's sacrifice. Stahl strikes out. Gephard gets first on error by Cowgill and goes to second. Baxter strikes out. We secured nothing in our half.

The Kansans got one more in the fifth. Bliss drops Barnes hot liner; Kennedy hits safe and Cowgill's error lets Barnes home; close fielding prevents further scoring.

Nebraska again draws a goose-egg in her half. Kindler hits safe, but fails to get around.

In the sixth Reeder makes two pretty catches of Stahl's and Gephard's flies and Baxter goes out at first. Our men fill the bases in their half, but can get no further, and the Kansans come in for the seventh. In this inning we add two more to our total. Kindler opens up with a three-bagger and scores on an error of Frisby's,

and Cowgill reaches first. He gets to third, while Johnson is retired, and scores on Rhea's grounder.

Washburn gets their last scores in the eighth. Frisby reaches first on an error by Rhoades, second on Moore's fumble, third on error of Johnson, while Irelan reaches second. Robinson pops up to Johnson, who throws wild and all come home. C. Stahl goes out to Kindler, Gephard walks to first, and after Baxter's out to Kindler, scores on a wild throw of Moore. Nebraska comes in with the score in favor of the visitors, but soon knock out three runs and the game. Rhoades gets his base on balls. Reeder gets hit, goes to second on Frisby's error and to third on catcher's fumble. Moore brings him in. Bliss hits safe and Moore scores on Robinson's error. Bliss scores on an error by Stahl. Robinson's catch of Cowgill's fly, after a hard backward run, in this inning, was one of the features of the game. The visitors could do nothing in the ninth. Below is the score in detail:

RIFLES EXHIBITION DRILL.

The Pershing Rifles' annual exhibition drill will take place next Thursday evening at 7 o'clock on the campus. No organization connected with the University has suffered so much from the present war and consequent enlistment of students as the Rifles. Captain Oury, First Lieutenant Weeks and Sergeants Brown and Roddy, all volunteered and the company was left without officers. Nevertheless those remaining determined to continue the organization and last week elected a complete set of new officers. The company has been recruited up from the best drilled men of the battalion and the high degree of efficiency in which Captain Oury left them has been maintained. Last night the company decided to give their annual exhibition and it promises to be up to the standard of previous years. The entire company will appear in white duet trousers. This will be the only opportunity of the year to see any drilling in "ducks" for the customary order to appear in them will not be issued this year. The gold medal will be contested for, and the winner will have the privilege of wearing it during the summer. CRAWFORD WINS HIS SUIT.

The trial of the suit of Frank Crawford of Omaha against the Athletic association of the University of Nebraska was completed in the district court yesterday morning and the case given to the jury shortly before noon. Following the conclusion of the case Judge Smith adjourned court until Monday morning and instructed the jury to bring in a sealed verdict, which it did after being out about three hours. Although the verdict was a sealed one, the jurors announced that it was for the plaintiff in the sum of \$221.67. Crawford sued for \$225, which he claimed was due him for services as coach of the University athletic association several years ago. The case turned largely on the question whether the present athletic association of the University is a new organization or whether it is a reorganization of the former one when Crawford was coach. The University share of the gate receipts, amounting to \$250, at the inter-state football game played here last Thanksgiving day, was attached by Crawford.

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
