Resolutions Passed by the State Senate Charging Him With Misconduct.

SEVERITY THE PRINCIPAL CHARGE MADE.

given of late in the daily papers, in regard to Colonel John M. Stotsenburg. the recently appointed colonel of the First Nebraska, now in the Philippine

Anything which ealls into prominence in any way, one who is well known at the University cannot fail to be of interest to university students. All cadets of last year remersber Colonel Stotsenburg, and know how he endeavored to instill into them some of the real spirit of militarism. He believed that the regiment of cadets should have practical knowledge of military affairs and during the course of the winter gave many interesting illustrated talks on camp life, on fort life, and on many other phases of the subject. In fact in everything he did have as commandant of cadets, tended to put the practical side of military affairs to the front. No complaints were ever made against him while he held his university office.

He left Lincoln as a major of volunteers, and has since been promoted to the rank of Colonel, owing to the resignation of Col. Bratt. Soon after complaints began to be made against him individually, and later a petition has been signed by many of the regiment and sent to the war department asking that he be withdrawn. Whereas, These charges have been officially filed with the secretary of war and

Whereas, The humblest private volunteer soldier, whether at home or 10,000 miles away is entitled to the full protection of every right, there-

Resolved, That our senators and representatives in congress be requested to urge the honorable secretary of war to detach Colonel Stotsenburg from the First Nebraska volunteers, United States army, and return him to duty in the regular army. And

Resolved. That upon the return of the First Nebraska regiment to America, when testimony can be heard, that these charges so universally believed, by the friends of the men of this regment should be fully investigated and such punishment inflicted as the case, if proven, deserves.

Resolved, further, That the secretary of war, be also requested to bear and determine all charges now on file, in the office of the adjutant general of the army against officers, for violation of army regulations towards volunited soldiers from the state of Ne-

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutium shall be transmitted to the sceretury of war at once.

UNIVERSITY NOTES.

The fourteenth biennial report of the board of regents to the governor has just been transmitted to the legis'ature, and in it are some interest ing statistics. It shows that the university has increased in attendance the past biennium from 1,506 to 1,915. Its eproliment has gained 25.07 per cent. The number of collegiate students has gained 13 per cent and its graduate students 26 /2 per cent. The gain in the school of mechanic arts has been 125 per cent and in the school of agriculture 54 per cent. Five hundred and seventeen students have graduated the past three years out of its 4,073 alumni. It has granted 80 higher degrees the past three years as against 50 during the previous history of the university.
