GYM. NOTES.

Dr. Hastings visited Omaha Monday in the interests of the dual pentathlon with the Omaha Y. M. C. A. and the American association for the advancement of physical education.
 The Omaha board of education, through the efforts of Superintendent Pearce, have made an appropriation for the necessary anthropometric instruments to examine between 20,000 and 25,000 school children. This examination will be like the one conducted in Lincoln last spring and from the figures obtained, Dr. Hastings will be able to compare the physique of Nebraska children with those of other states. These statistics will be presented by Dr. Hastings to the national educational association at Los Angeles, Cal., next July.
 The pentathlon with Omaha will be held April 15 in their gymnasium and the trophy is a handsome silver plate, twelve inches in diameter, and engraved with the name of the winning team.
 A rate of \$2.20 to Omaha and return for the pentathlon has been secured, providing ten men can be secured to go.
 Poynter has withdrawn from the pentathlon team on account of illness, and Pearce, fifth man in the late pentathlon, will take his place.
 Of the forty men in the athletic class, twenty-six have decided upon their respective field day events. There is enough material to form two track teams, each equal to any of the track teams of former years.
 The Omaha Y. M. C. A. has three men who vaulted over 9 feet, and three who jumped 5 feet, in their preliminary pentathlon Saturday evening.
 Arrangements are nearly completed for a dual athletic meet with State University of Iowa at Iowa City May 19. Ten men decided by the local field day, May 13, will constitute our team.
