COLLEGES.
 The intercollegiate strength test was broken April 12 by a Harvard man, H. F. Cochems. He made 1,761½ kilograms on the official intercollegiate testing machines. G. D. Godfrey of Bowdoin up to now has been champion, with 1,716 as his best work. Cochems is 24 years old, stands 5 feet, 11½ inches and weighs 183 pounds. He attended the University of Wisconsin last year.

A new system of graduate base ball coaching modelled after the plan used by the Harvard foot ball team last year, has been adopted by nine this year. Under the head coach will be a number of subordinates who will be detailed to the positions with which they are most familiar. These men will be on the field every Thursday to do active coaching.

The fifth annual debate between Harvard and Princeton was held last Wednesday night at Princeton, and the decision of the judges was given in favor of Harvard for the fifth time. The subject was: "Resolved, That a formal alliance between the United States and Great Britain, for the protection and advancement of their common interests, is advisable." Princeton supported the affirmative and Harvard the negative.

Harvard has challenged the University of California for a foot ball game at Cambridge on October 21st. The Californians are desirous of meeting an eastern team, but want to play on the home grounds.

Professor A. R. Cook of Northwestern university has made arrangements for the most extensive geological trip ever undertaken for the university. He will leave Evanston with seven of his students in June and go to Laramie City, Wyo., and from there 300 miles overland toward Montana and the Yellowstone. The party will be gone over a month, and will make a thorough study of the geological formations. Professor Cook has taken two trips of this nature before, one in the Ural mountains and one along the Pacific coast. If this one is as successful as the others such journeys will be made annual events.

The freshman medical class at the University of Michigan held a hot meeting a few days ago, which lasted over two hours, the object of the meeting being to determine if the class wished to adopt the honor system which is in vogue with the '99 medical class. There was great opposition to the plan in spite of the fact that it had worked well in other classes. There was much feeling about the matter, the chief opposition being on the ground that each student act as a spy and report his transgressing classmate which idea was extremely repulsive to the class in general.

Michigan defeated Chicago last week in the debate closing the northwestern association contests. They debated the affirmative of the question: "Admitting it to be the constitutional, is a federal graduated income tax desirable in this country." They received an unanimous decision. Michigan's debaters were Kingsley, Simons and Saenger.

The Minnesota Ariel offers below a suggestion which is worthy of consideration: "A writer in the Beloit Weekly suggests that a censor be appointed to correct and revise the remarks made by Casper Whitney in regard to western athletics published in Harper's Weekly. While some of Mr. Whitney's statements may have been erroneous or illogical, still on the whole he has been as fair as a man in his far-off position could be. We would go Beloit one better and suggest that Harper's employ a western man to write up western athletics, or it would be impossible for one man to grasp the athletic situation in our whole country."

The Cornell "fans" are greatly pleased and encouraged by the announcement that their coach, Hughie Jennings, the crack base ball player, will probably enter the Cornell law school for a three years course.

Messrs. Dashiell and McClung, who were the officials of the Yale and Pennsylvania games last fall, have consented to serve in both games this year. The gold foot balls, for which subscriptions were raised last fall at Harvard, have been presented to the men who played in the Yale game, and to Manager Nourse and Mr. McMaster. In making the presentation, Professor Hollis, in behalf of the athletics committee, said that he had never been called upon to perform a more pleasant duty in connection with Harvard athletics; and that he wished to commend and congratulate the team not only for their victories, but for the general character of all their work last fall. The foot balls are designed for watch charms, but are inscribed with the score, date and place of the Yale game, together with the name of the owner.
