**University 11—Wesleyan 0.**

Last Saturday the University football team defeated ten methodists and one high school man by the score of 11 to 0. The game was one of the most listless, spiritless and unexciting games ever played in Lincoln. In the first place Wesleyan came down Satu day morning saying that several of their men were unable to play and that she would not play unless Coach Thomas was allowed to play. This our inter collegiate relations would not permit us to do. But our management could not afford to declare off the game with only three hours notice, so it was agreed that the methodists might play Bull, a high school man, and further that the game was not to decide the state championship.

The game consisted of fifteen minute halves. The first half consisted of anything but brilliant plays. The only features were injuries. Both Pearse and Kingsbury received quite serious injuries. Pearse was compelled to retire, Montgomery taking his place. Time was called with the ball on Nebraska's 40-yard line.

Both sides gingered up a little in the second half. Wesleyan kicked off thirty yards, and the University returned it to her 20 yard line. Shedd went through the Methodist's line for eight yards. Gains of five, three and ten yards followed. Schwartz carried the ball around the right end for nearly a 20 yard gain. Several slow gains followed. Shedd pushed the ball through center for ten yards, Benedict around the end for eight. Twice more Shedd went through Wesleyan's center, carrying the ball over the line and kicking goal. Score 6 to 0.

Wesleyan kicked off. Nebraska returned the ball nearly to her 25 yard line. Schwartz and Carver divided honors. Nebraska gained twenty yards by punting. Shedd took the ball through center, Cowgill advanced it slightly. Nebraska again took the ball on Wesleyan's punt. Slow gains took the ball within thirty-five yards of Wesleyan's goal. Then came the feature of the game. The ball was punted to cowgill and he kicked goal from center. Time was called a few seconds later. Score 11 to 0.
