

The Field Day a Great Success.

RECORDS BROKEN BY ANDRESON, BENEDICT,
HANSEN AND PILLSBURY.

On last Saturday afternoon occurred the best Field Day contest in the history of the Uni. Athletics occupy a position never before attained, and the records compare very favorably with those of leading institutions. The future of athletics is assured. The meet proved to us that we have the men and a system of training which can beat records, and with the hearty co-operation of faculty and students we shall go on unto perfection. A large number of enthusiastic spectators were eagerly awaiting the beginning of the battle when Referee Roscoe Pound called for the first event, the 100-yd. dash. The run was swift and close, bringing loud applause from the bleachers. Andreson crossed the tape in 10 sec. La Salle 10 1-5, Heartt 10 2-5. The winner broke the previous record which was 10 1/2 sec. Benedict captured the spectators in the running broad jump, clearing 20 ft. 3 1/2 inches, surpassing the past record of 19 ft. 4 in.; Pepoon 2nd, 18 ft. 1 in.; LeMar 3rd, 16 ft. 3 in. Roy Sawyer covered a mile in 5 min. 6 2-5 sec. He showed endurance and ran in good form and with ease, taking the lead and maintaining it throughout the race. Waterman came in second in 5:10 2-5. The half mile race was also won by Sawyer in 2 min. 26 sec.; Clinton second, 2:27 2-5. The Judges ordered the events to be doubled and while Benedict, Pillsbury and Story were scraping the sky in the pole vault the giants were putting the shot. Turner's height and long reach stood him in good stead, winning first place at 32 ft. 1 1/4 in.; Hansen 2nd, 30 ft. 9 1/2 in.; Stull 3rd, 29 ft. 7 1/2 in. The 440-yd. dash was the most exciting event in the meet. Benedict took the lead with Andreson and Story about 10 feet in the rear. On the home stretch Andreson by an unprecedented spurt shot ahead, crossing the line in 52 4-5 sec.; Benedict 2nd, 53 2-5; Story 3rd, 61. In the running high jump, Pillsbury maintained his previous policy, breaking his last record of 5 ft. 4 3/4 in. by 3/8 of an inch. The hurdle racing was an interesting feature and was viewed with pleasure by the spectators. In the 120-yd. race Heartt won first place, 20

1-5 sec.; La Salle 2nd, 20 2-5. The 220-yd. hurdle was captured by Pepoon over Waterman in a close finish time, 33 sec. The hammer throw was victory to Hansen, who by his noted football strength and skill, made a new record of 87 ft. 2 1/2 in. His previous record was 78 ft. Lemar second, 82ft. 5 1/2 in.; Turner 3rd, 86 ft. 1/2 in. Throwing the discus was a decided novelty. Pillsbury made the brilliant throw of 94 ft., which was within 2 ft. 8 in. of the Olympic record of 95 ft. 8 in., made at the games in Greece last year. The handsome silver cup donated by Armstrong Clothing Co. was awarded to the Sophomore class.

INTER-COLLEGIATE MEET.
