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TARKIO MEETS DEFEAT.

Nebraska "Shows" the Men From Missouri--Score is 24 to 0--Good Game in the Second Half.

Another good day, though a trifle windy during part of the game, brought out a fair crowd Saturday to the bleachers and side lines, to say nothing of the second and third story windows in University hall, to see the University team again demonstrate its ability on the grid-iron. The Tarkio boys brought with them a good reputation earned last year, and had they received longer and more careful training, the score might have been different. Two of the touchdowns were secured on flukes, and the earned score was really 12-0. Superior weight and training would undoubtedly have won a victory for the home team in any event, but the victory, as it is, is one not to be despised. The teams lined up as follows:

Nebraska was again fortunate in winning the toss, and chose the south goal, with the wind in their favor. Both Cowgill and Erwin distinguished themselves in punting, gaining from five to fifteen yards on every exchange of kicks. It took but few minutes for Nebraska to score her first touchdown by a series of line bucks by Benedict, Erwin and Kingsbury, the last of whom carried the ball across. Melford kicked goal. Score 6-0.

Cowgill made the long kick of the day in returning Tarkio's kick off, netting a good twenty yards for Nebraska. The Tarkio man fumbled the catch and Kingsbury fell on the ball. In just two minutes' play Erwin had been shoved across for the second touchdown. Melford kicked goal. Score 12-0.

It was now feared that the game would prove to be a repetition of the Hastings affair. Cowgill made a good gain before downed by Tarkio at the kickoff. Then followed a series of line smashes, that carried the ball steadily toward the enemy's goal. First Williams would carry the ball for four

yards, followed by Kingsbury who would hit the line for six or eight yards more; then Pillsbury and Erwin would advance it six to eight yards each, followed by Turner with his proverbial five yards. Erwin at last ended the matter by scoring the third down--goal was kicked. Score 18-0.

Tarkio braced up now, and began to have some effect on the line, advancing the ball about fifteen yards; when, on a third down, Brew broke through and tackled their man behind the line. Nebraska secured the ball. Williams made the only end run of the game made by Nebraska for fifteen yards; but Tarkio broke through on the next down with a loss to Nebraska sufficient to force Cowgill to make a quarter kick. Tarkio was now holding the line well and Nebraska again punted. After a moment's more play time was called.

Luck did not favor the Tarkio boys, for the wind that had aided Cowgill in punting, had now gone down, as the sides changed goals. Nebraska kicked off and Tarkio soon demonstrated that the second half was not to be a repetition of the first. Waugh and Gibson, their halves, hit the Nebraska line and end with telling effect. Easton made a fine end run for fifteen yards around the right end. It looked as though they might continue their advance and score. An off side play by Nebraska gave them five yards more. But here Nebraska called a halt on their progress, secured the ball and started it in the opposite direction. It was being steadily advanced into Tarkio's territory when a foul lost Nebraska the ball. Tarkio was held and forced to kick, but failed to kick out of danger. The ball was again worked back by Nebraska, and Turner pushed across for touchdown. Melford kicked goal. Score 24-0.

Nebraska advanced the ball past the center in Tarkio's territory before they were held, and the ball passed to Tarkio. Gibson made a neat gain of five yards for Tarkio. Here Rankin took Easton's place in Tarkio's line, and they resumed play by gaining five yards more. Time was now short, and as a last effort they attempted a trick play but failed. Time was called, and the score was 24 to 0, in Nebraska's favor.
