Owing to the decease of the faculty class, Mr. Clements will work with the athletic classes.

The class in advanced gymnastics is showing up in good form this year. There are twelve or more in the class, among whom are Stebbins, Hastie, McDonald, Wilson, McCreery and Hunt.

Gymnastic classes in physical training began this week in three sections:

- First section—8:00, M., T., W., Th., F.—Mr. Pryce.
- Second section—3:00, M., T., W., Th., F.—Mr. Stebbins.
- Third section—1:00, T., Th., S., M. 12.

Over thirty men are in the athletic sections. Many more would have entered but for the faculty restrictions on the number of hours. It would seem that men might be allowed to carry the regular number of hours and also take these athletic classes. Most men can carry twenty hours with athletics better than seventeen without. If the faculty would make this allowance there would be no danger of studies being slighted and athletics would be much benefited.

In their last regular meeting the Athletic Board called the attention of the foot-ball committee to the rules adopted by the Athletic Board of last year. These rules are on pages 303 and 304 in the University Calendar. Rule 1 defines "a bona fide student doing full work" as a student carrying at least fourteen hours. Such a student must have been doing this work up until the first game in which he participates. Attention was called to rule 6 also, which has been observed by the University in previous years. It deals with those who are delinquent in their studies. The foot ball committee was directed to strictly enforce this rule. The board wishes to maintain athletics within strict bounds of honor. The finances have been put on a strictly business basis and the board intends that the make-up of the teams shall be on a basis fair and impartial. Places on teams belong to strong students and their right is to be maintained. The board intends that University honor shall not be tainted with professionalism. Sporty, lounging triflers with University work will find hard work to get places on the teams.
