A debate may be held with Colorado this year, but no definite arrangements have been made. The proposition of an inter-state debating league was discussed, but nothing was done in regard to it.

The Union literary society passed resolutions Friday night asking the Junior class to give them its proportionate amount of representation on the Junior Annual staff, since one of the business managers is no longer a member of the society from which he was elected, that society asks a true representation from the class.

The Union musical, given last Friday night, was one of the most attractive events of the present University year. The vocal numbers were wildly applauded. Miss Grace Reynolds in her vocal solo "The Flight of Ages" won the audience at once. She responded to an encore. Mr. Herbert S. Evans' selection was keenly appreciated as usual. "Ectasy," a vocal selection in three parts by Miss Lillian Chase, was full of melody and power. Miss Chase has a well trained voice and a winning style which captured the audience. A. W. Haynes, in his solo "The Mighty Deep" showed a deep rich bass voice, which is well controlled. The violin solo by Miss Brownell brought forth such cheers that an encore was necessary. Miss Rose Olson showed careful training and much skill in her piano solo, "Waldes Ranschen." Perhaps the greatest treat among the instrumental numbers was the playing of the orchestra consisting of violins by Hugo Heim, Rose Clark, Carolyn Melick; cornet, Ole Olson; piano, Phil Hudson. The orchestra responded to an encore with a lively two-step selection which made the old hall vibrate, and some of the shoes restless. Miss Julia E. McCune's recitation, "Classmates," was so rendered as to draw every one into the spirit of the selection. She has an impressive style.

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The Bible study is in a most prosperous condition, and the committee deserve much credit for the way in which the matter has been handled.

Mr. John Boose, President of the association will go to the State C. E. convention next Sunday, and will speak in the interest of missions.

The Y. M. C. A. social Saturday evening was largely attended, and all seemed to enjoy the evening. These young men's socials are becoming very popular and are proving beneficial to the association. During the evening the Tarkio football team came in and was greeted with applause and cheers.

A letter was received the other day from C. C. Michener, member of the international committee, stating that he will make the local association a visit in a short time. He has many friends among the young men, and all will be pleased to know that they will have the opportunity of meeting him soon.

The Y. M. C. A. has under serious consideration the establishment of a lecture course. The course, as proposed, consists of six lectures by such prominent men as Robert McIntyre, "Bob" Burdette, Gen. J. B. Gordon, and others. The entire expense is estimated at nearly one thousand dollars, and it is proposed to pay this by charging one dollar for a ticket admitting bearer to each lecture of the series. It is thought that twelve hundred season tickets could be disposed of at this price in the school and city.
