Lewis talked on the "Preliminary Survey of the Fauna of Lake Erie." Frank E. Watson, graduate fellow in the university from Brown university, read a paper on the "Work at the Woods Hall Marine Laboratory."

The next indoor athletic contest will be that annually held in the gymnasium on charter day. Although this contest seems far distant, training has already commenced and the first preliminary contest will be held Saturday afternoon. The event will be the standing high jump. As usual the three best in each event will contest on charter day. Dr. Hastings expects to make this exhibition even more interesting than previous ones have been, as more students have registered for the training or athletic classes and greater interest is being taken in the work.

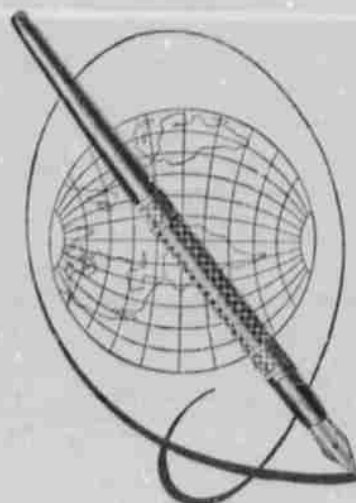
