Whereas, It has pleased God to take from his work on earth, our fellow student, L. A. Smith; and

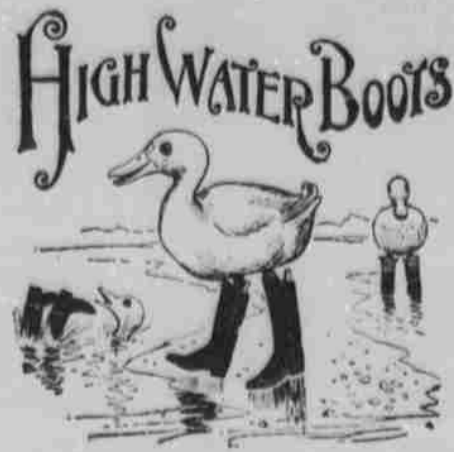
Whereas, Mr. Smith was a highly esteemed and honored member of the class of 1900; therefore, be it
