VALUABLE RELICS.

G. W. Prather of Bloomington called at the State Historical Library last Wednesday. He was looking for an old pair of stirrups which he had found about twenty-six years ago, near Riverton. The stirrups are of old Moorish make and are supposed to have been lost by some party of Spanish gold hunters, and are proof that the searchers came inland as far as Nebraska at least. There were several parties who came inland in search of the precious metal. Coronado's in 1541, Penalososa's in 1662 and various others. Which of these lost the stirrups of course we cannot tell but it is supposed to have been Coronado for his are the only records which show that this latitude was reached.

The history of these stirrups since they were found is quite interesting. Mr Prather gave them to a friend of his to bring to the State Historical Society and they were turned over to Prof. Samuel Anghey who was then in charge of the library. Mr Anghey sent them to the Smithsonian Institute not knowing what they were. There they were identified as being of Moorish make and the kind used by Coronado's gold hunters. They remained at the Smithsonian for several years but were taken out later by some one from Nebraska supposedly by Senator Paddock, without permission. One was given to J. E. Lamaster of Tecumseh, the other to a friend of his and all trace of it is lost. Mr. Prather, however, still claims to own them, and said that he only brought them to the Nebraska Historical Society for safe keeping. He intends looking them up and recovering them.
