LIBRARY ASSOCIATION.

The state library association of Nebraska held a meeting in Palladian hall December 26th. This was the best meeting ever held by the association. More libraries in the state were represented than ever before. The leading paper was by Mr. Johnson Brigham, state librarian of Iowa. His subject was "What a Library Commission Can do for Nebraska."

The object of these meetings is the advancement of the library interests of the state in every possible way, not only by aid to existing libraries, but especially by encouraging the establishment of new ones in the smaller towns. The latter purpose the association hopes especially to help by the traveling library system and a strong effort is being made to secure favorable legislation this winter. In this work the association has the active support of the Federation of Womans' clubs and it already has the endorsement of the state teachers association.

Officers for the coming year were elected as follows: President, J. I. Wyer of the state university; vice-president, Miss C. C. Dennis of the Lincoln city library; secretary, Miss Bertha Baumer of the Omaha public library.

NEW SPECIMENS.

During the past meeting of the state teachers association in Lincoln, a number of teachers and principals of schools brought to the state museum specimens of importance from various localities. The most important perhaps being that from Kimball county, donated by Mr. R. D. Stearns, principal of schools at Kimball. Mr. Stearns while watching the progress of the Union Pacific well at Kimball discovered at a depth of fifty-five feet a nearly solid bed of bones seven feet thick, a large number of which were donated by him to the state university. The bones consist chiefly of the early rhinoceros of Nebraska (Ailalops), together with the pliocene horse, camel, eagle, deer, and others. This probably gives evidence that the famous rhinoceros beds of Kansas extend into Nebraska.
