The plans have been made by Prof. Richards and Mr. G. W. Rhodes, assistant superintendent of the B. & M., and when once put into operation it is expected that a yearly feature of the work of the mechanical engineering students will be the testing of locomotives while on their regular runs. Next week Prof. Richards and Messrs. B. W. Benedict, Fred Dorman, C. S. Orton, and S. C. Campbell will inaugurate this work by a series of three tests requiring three regular runs of the locomotive between Lincoln and Hastings.
