COMMUNICATION.

To the Editor of the *Nebraskan-Hesperian*:—

To one not directly interested in either of the factions it is apparent that there is less done to promote the best interests of debating in the University of Nebraska in the Debating association than there is to promote personal ambitions and to do the other side. Last year there was a long drawn out struggle. The prime object for which the Debating association was organized was thrown to one

side, while the various factions shook their fists in each others' faces and called hard names.

From appearances there will be another spectacle this year. Whether it will be long or as hotly contested is a question no one can answer very satisfactorily.

Under the present constitution it is possible for one faction or the other to run in any number of outsiders by paying twenty-five cents for each of them. The faction that has the most money or does the most hustling wins. As a general thing these new "members" have never before taken the slightest interest in the debates. If there is a deficit in the treasury they are the ones to shirk. Of the men who were run in last Thursday evening, it is safe to say that not one in five attend a debate of the season or contributed a cent towards the expenses. Last year the same state of affairs existed. As long as the present arrangement lasts it will be possible for those men who haven't the least interest in debating to run the affairs of the association and to dictate to its real supporters, no matter to which faction they belong.

No sane person would for a moment claim that this was just.

I am not an ardent factionist myself and there are others who belong in the same class. All I desire is to see justice done.

The principal place of business of such corporation shall be at the city of Lincoln, Lancaster county, Nebraska; the general nature of the business to be transacted, the publication of a college daily newspaper at the University of Nebraska, to be known as "The Daily *Nebraskan*," and other publications of a like nature at the said university; the amount of capital stock authorized fifteen hundred (\$1,500) dollars, fully paid in and divided into three hundred (\$300) shares of five dollars (\$5) each; the term of existence of such corporation, fifty years from the 1st day of May, 1901; the highest amount of indebtedness or liability which such corporation is at any time to subject itself, six hundred (\$600) dollars, and its affairs are to be conducted by an editor-in-chief, business manager and a treasurer.
