Taking advantage of the well known fact that stars can be seen in the middle of the day from the bottom of a We are sorry to say that by some mys- deep well. Prot. Watson has carried out sunk a celiar twenty feet beneath the surface of the ground, over which a five story building is being erected. At the top of a hill near the spot, sixty feet above the bottom of this cellar, powerful reflectors are to be placed, throwing rays of light down a large tube ending in the cellar, where the observer is stationed. It is thought that by this means better observations of the sun can be obtained than ever before; and astronomers and louers of the science will await the results of the experiment with interest.
