

a large infusion of Teutonic words? Like causes, as a rule, produce like results, and vice versa.

The religion leads to the same conclusion as the language. Could a heathen and christian nation have existed side by side, have occupied the same land, and neither have influenced the other? "To judge from the stubbornness with which Romanized nations everywhere rejected heathendom, and the facility with which Teutonic tribes accepted christianity, it was not the Britons who would have become worshippers of Woden but the English who would have become worshippers of Christ." But Christianity wholly disappeared. When it was brought back it was not by the Welsh, but by missionaries from Rome, and when the Latin language returned it came as a foreign tongue needing an interpreter.

The law as utterly disappeared as the language and religion. If any fragment of old provincial life had survived, would it not have been that which survived in all the other provinces—the law? In Roman times the towns played an important part, but under English rule they went to ruin. When they were re-peopled it was not by a British but by an English population. It took many years for cities like London and York to cover the same space once filled by Roman towns. If Celtic life had flowed on as before would this have been the case? Then, too, the laws of these towns were Teutonic. They knew nothing of decurions or curiales. "The political institutions that we find established in the conquered land, as well as the social uses of the people, were utterly different from those of the Roman or Celt; not only were they those which are common to the German race, but they are the most purely German institutions that any branch of the German race has preserved."

The proof is conclusive that the English were not exterminated by the Danes, since after the reign of three Danish kings they were able to restore the English dynasty and hold it until overpowered by the Normans.

It is undoubtedly true that many, who call themselves Englishmen, are more or less Celtic; but as we assert that the founders of the United States were English, while we freely admit that all those who call themselves Americans to-day are by no means English, so, in the face of established facts, we cannot deny that the tribes who laid the foundation of modern England, those who have given her the sterling qualities which have made her one of the greatest nations in the world, that spirit of enterprise which has carried the English flag into every corner of the globe, those tribes were those who left their native homes across the German sea, to become neither Roman nor Briton, but to found a nation for themselves, and to hand down to succeeding ages the inheritance of Englishmen. '86.
