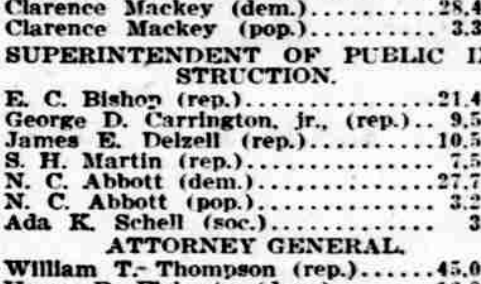

Microscopic Writing.

A remarkable machine made by a lately deceased member of the Royal Microscopical society for writing with a diamond seems to have been broken up by its inventor. A specimen of its work is the Lord's prayer of 227 letters, written in the 1,237,000 of a square inch, which is at the rate of 53,800,000 letters or 15 complete Bibles, to a single square inch. To decipher the writing it is necessary to use a 1-12 inch objective, which is the high power lens physicians employ for studying the most minute bacteria.
