Senator Burkett Will Speak at Newman Grove and Humphrey.

The month of October will be a hot one, politically in Nebraska. Republican speeches will be made in every county in the state and the gospel of Republicanism expounded by able men. On Saturday afternoon, October 3, Senator Burkett will address the voters of Newman Grove and vicinity, and in the evening will speak at Humphrey.

**Y. M. C. A. Notes.**

A Young Men's Christian Association has been organized in Columbus. It was not the intention to organize until the building was ready for occupancy but it was found necessary. There were matters that the provisional committee did not feel that they could pass upon and it was necessary to have an organization ready to receive the building when completed.

A committee on organization and constitution was appointed. They drafted a constitution in conformity with the uniform requirements of the International committee and recommended that the provisional committee organize.

In accordance with the recommendation the committee adjourned and those present organized by electing Henry Hockenberger chairman and M. Brugger secretary.

The constitution submitted by the committee was read and adopted by a motion that provided that amendments might be made at the next meeting.

Last Friday night the meeting reassembled at the call of the chairman and adopted several amendments to the constitution.

After the consideration of the constitution the following directors were elected: H. Hockenberger, M. Brugger, J. D. Stires, E. H. Neumann, W. S. Evans, W. L. Chenoweth, J. C. Echols, H. Regats, Jr., I. E. Britell, I. Brock, J. T. Boyd, David Thomas, R. Ramey, A. E. Vallier and O. C. Sheldon.

The board organized by electing M. Brugger as temporary chairman and I. E. Britell as temporary secretary. H. Hockenberger was elected president, O. C. Sheldon vice president, I. H. Britell recording secretary and M. Brugger treasurer. The following were elected trustees, G. W. Phillips, G. A. Scott, H. A. Clark, T. Friedhof, C. H. Sheldon, A. J. Galley, J. E. Paul and H. S. Elliott.

Mr. Hockenberger then came from a meeting of the furniture committee and in a few remarks thanked the board for the compliment paid him in electing him president but said that for reasons which seemed to him sufficient he could not accept the position. After failing to convince him that he should reconsider his decision he was elected vice president and O. C. Sheldon president. It is a matter of regret to those interested in the association that Mr. Hockenberger, who is the acknowledged father of the movement should not be its first president. The officers elected will hold office until the annual election next May.

The building is rapidly nearing completion and as soon as it is finished it is hoped to have arrangements perfected for beginning work. As soon as the directors have determined upon the different classes of membership applications will be received.

A number of applications for dormitories have been received and as soon as they are furnished and ready for inspection they will doubtless be readily filled as they are very attractive and desirable.

Late tests showed an average tensile strength of 24,000 pounds to the square inch, equal to that of cast-iron, and some specimens resisted 17 1/2 tons to the square inch, equal to the tensile strength of wrought-iron.
