He came on with a flying start and made the first quarter in 32½; the half in 1:08 1.5; three quarters in 1:45 1.5 and finished strong in 2:20 2.5, about one second slower than Coulter's paced Class B mile on the same track last year

A reception and ball was tendered the wheelmen at the city hall in the evening. Referce Ebersol of Omaha awarded the prizes. Refreshments were served, everyone got acquainted and all promed to attend the state meet at Lincoln in 1896.
