**Social and Personal**

The bridesmaids, gowned in different colors and carrying meteor roses, entered separated by a distance of six feet in the following order: Miss Lucy Griffith, in a dainty light blue gown of satin striped tulle over blue taffeta silk, the neck cut round with a berth of point lace and trimmings of ruffles and Honiton lace; Miss Manie Mallalieu was gowned in yellow. The bodice was of sunburst chiffon, décolleté, puffed sleeves, with trimmings of mousseline and pearl passementeries. A rich yellow brocade satin skirt; Miss Bebe Wood was gowned in pink silk mulle over pink taffeta. The bodice and sleeves were made of a succession of puffings and white lace inserting. The square cut neck was finished with spreading of chiffon and lace rufflings. The skirt had puffs and inserting around the hips and was finished with a French flounce elaborately trimmed as the bodice. Mulle sash, Miss Mae Burr's pretty gown consisted of a bodice of white satin covered with white liberty chiffon. Around this were narrow stripes of pale green velvet ribbon, arranged to form a Zouave jacket, running from the neck, which was cut low to the waist were numerous little chiffon ruffles. The long shirred sleeves had little velvet ribbons between the headings. Green taffeta skirt over which fell a sash of white chiffon and ruffles. Miss Henrietta Holcomb wore an elaborate gown of lavender brocaded satin. The bodice was of accordion pleated crepe de chine, with puffed sleeves. The neck, which was cut low and off the shoulders, was trimmed with a pleating of mousseline. The shoulder straps were odd, one of lavender and the other of lavender and orange, interwoven velvet ribbons. The brocade satin skirt was finished at the lower edge with fans of accordion pleated crepe de chine rosettes of the mousseline. A moire sash edged with pleated mousseline completed the costume. Miss Marian Ogden was a sweet little maid of honor. Her gown of the Caps Greenaway style reached below her shoe tops and was of white mousseline de soie. She wore a quaintly arranged short veil of tulle. She carried pink bridesmaid roses. The bride, Miss Moore, appeared with her father, S. E. Moore. Her beautiful blonde beauty appeared to magnificent advantage, set off by the white tulle veil, which fell in graceful folds over a gown of heavy white satin, en train. Its beautiful simplicity was completed by trimmings of mousseline and point lace. She carried bride roses. The bride's entire wedding toilette was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Scipio Dundy. At the altar, where graceful palms were banks high, the gen-

tlemen separated and passed to either side of the chancel, leaving space for the maids to take their places between them. The groom and best man, Mr. Sam E. Low, entering from the right, met the bride at the altar, where the solemn ceremony was performed by Dr. Hindman. The bridal procession made their exit by the right aisle while the Mendelssohn wedding march was being played. At the residence only relatives and the bridal party were entertained after the wedding. There the decorations were of American Beauty roses and palms. The bride, whose charming and vivacious manners have won her a host of friends, has been reared in Lincoln and is one of whom she may well be proud. The groom is connected with the district clerk's office and, like his wife, has won wide popularity among social and business friends.
