Mrs. Belle Oakley Maxwell was the dramatic star with perfect self-possession, grace and in smooth tones she read her lines with an elegance and finish heretofore unknown to an amateur. I wish the croaking soubrettes who afflict the west with their vaudeville manners and voices could be instructed by Mrs. Maxwell how to sing and dance and be a lady too. Mr. R. H. Manley, who was Mrs. Maxwell's leading man, could not be distinctly heard. He keeps his mouth nearly closed when he is speaking and in consequence the words are all chewed up when they reach the audience. He has a habit of shuffling his feet when he is delivering his part which detracts from the effect of his lines. Mrs. Ladd, in the last act of the "Naval Engagement" reached a climax and descended from it with the art of a student of acting. Mr. Townley bore his part of this scene with finesse. The audience showed their appreciation of the creators of the situation by insisting a before-the-curtain appearance. Mrs. Silver was a charming ingenue in grey and scarlet. All the ladies of the caste were effectively dressed. They never looked so pretty. Visually the stage and its human occupants were luxurious in color and the groupings were picturesque. Mr. Rudge gave Mr. Townley carte blanche on his furniture store and the result was very satisfactory. The versatility of Mr. Townley's talent has so long been recognized that surprise at the excellence of his acting, his managerial activity and the fact essential to discipline forty pretty people into a company able to present the show of Wednesday night is not excusable. The entertainment earned about four hundred dollars for Trinity church.
