The Kappa Kappa Gamma festivities which began on Tuesday of last week were continued during this week until Wednesday evening. Last Saturday evening there was a general reception for the town friends, faculty and other Greeks, at the home of Miss Clara Hammond. The receiving line was composed of the hostess, grand council, the Misses Bowersock of Kansas, Miss Laura Houtz and Miss Mabel Richards. Prof. Hagenow's orchestra was stationed in the north parlor and played during the evening. The house and lawn were decorated with light and dark-blue pennants and rosettes. The porches were covered with rugs and cushions and the lawn with comfortable little nocks and lanterns. In the dining room ices and cakes were served by some of the members of the home chapter. On Sunday morning the Episcopal church was filled with young people who had come to hear the special sermon preached by the Rev. H. Percy Silver. On Monday morning at six o'clock some of the Phi Kappa Psi boys gave a trolley ride for the grand council, a few of the delegates and some of the resident members.
