## ARNOLD BOTKLIN.

Arnold Booklin is to German art what Wagner is to German muaic and strange to nay both owe to the artistic, crazy Ledwig of Bavaria the means of accomplinhing their ideals.
Ao a youth in the Acedemy, Booklin wes noted for his woederful memory. When the atudente were given a bit of landecape to aketch be would lean comtortably tagainet a tres apparently engrosed with the panorame bofore him but not doing a atroke of work. Later in the day wheo he returned to his room his bruches flew over the canvas anc, he coon ebowed his fellow atudente how deoply thescene wes impreseed upon his mind. Each tree seemed to be reprodueed with s correcteese of tine that could ecaroly be credited by hie fellow workers when they eaw it the following day. Thie did well eoough for the limbe of trees but when it came to the human body hard stady from life whes necessery to resch perfection and Boeklin's draw. ing is far from faultiess. Some say he lacked the money for etudy in his youth. Othere that the jeelousy of his wife would allow no model in his studic. Be that as it may I soon forgot everything but the pootry of the conception when looking at his work.
Hio work may be divided into three subjecte-mythical, allogorical and religious. The firat named are hie greateot. They contain a aympathy with nature which is seldom tound except ia Greek etatues. Blawthorne felt ite sub tloty atanding bofore Praxiteles' faun and called it "neither man nor animal. and yet no monster, buta being in whom both races meet on friendly ground The idea growe coarse as we handle it, and hardebs in our grasp. But, if the apectator broode long over the atatue, he vill be conscious of ite spell; all the plesenatnees of Sylvan life will seem to otance, along with the kindred qualitie in the humas soul."
"The Play of the Waves," a picture which hange in the new Pinakothek of Munich, is abhorred by some people because of the nideous figuree which sport through the cold blue water but yet there is a charm about it like one of Andersents fairy stories and everyone feels it in time.
Boeklin wae born at Bexii and in hie religious paintinge can be traced the influence of the early German masters whose work he studied in his youth. In these he has simplitied his coloring and has depicted in a realiatic manner the drawn, agonized faces around the Christ. A thing which modern artists have not attempted.
The "Dance of Death," which figured in all literature and and art of Holbein's time, has aleo been a favorite subject of Boeklin. Of the many treatments of

The picture seoms prophetic of the life of the man. Boeklin is now para'yzed but works on for a fow hours each day with the one hand that can hold a brueb while he aays he knowe death waits back of his chair.
Perhape a little goseip as to Boeklin's life romance as it is retailed at the Berlin studion may be of intereet. While yet a young man, poor and unknown, he was wandering in Italy and etopped for the night at a small inn on the Campagne. A peasant girl who was serving the gueate attracted his artistic eye. She evemed so strong, so perfect in form and such a true child of nature, but lacking altogether a coul to understand its beauties. There is a deeply eentimental vein in all Germans and the wish came to Boeklin to train this untouched and perfect piece of nature until the soul ehould reapond to the beauty without and make the being complete.
The maiden of the Campagna became the wite of the artiet but her heart remained etone and the dream vanished. However, they live now in a villa in Italy and I have no doubt but that Madame Breklin has learned to cook "Kartofeln und apfeln" to the taste of everybody so the absence of soul is not especially regretted.
The greatest thing about Arnold Boeklin as an artiet is that he is national "Echt Deutsch" as the Germane would say. He has never been influene.
