Will you kindly see that each club in your state is furnished with a copy of this notice, referring to the biennial meeting of the general federation of women's clubs to be held in Milwaukee, Wis., June 4th to 9th, inclusive.

Rate—One regular first-class normal fare, plus two dollars, for the round trip from points in association territory, Utah and east to Milwaukee, Wis., and return, except that from points which the local one fare rate to Milwaukee is six dollars or less, rate of fare and one-third for the round trip will apply.

Date of Sale—Tickets to be sold from points in eastern committee territory on June 2-5, inclusive; from points in trans-Mississippi territory east of the eastern state lines of Colorado and Wyoming on June 2 and 3, and from points in Colorado, Wyoming and Utah on June 1 and 2, 1900.

Limit of ticket—Tickets to be good for return leaving Milwaukee up to and including June 11, 1900, except that by deposit of tickets with joint agent at Milwaukee on or before June 11, and upon payment of execution fee of fifty cents at time of deposit, return limit will be extended by agent of terminal line to leave Milwaukee up to and including June 30, 1900. All tickets to be limited to continuous passage in each direction, going trip to commence date of sale, and return trip date of execution.

Form of ticket—Special iron-clad signature form of ticket providing for punch description of passenger, going and return transit limits, execution by joint agent at Milwaukee upon payment of joint agency fee of fifty cents, also for extension by agent of terminal line at Milwaukee, upon deposit of tickets with joint agent to whom execution fee must be paid at time of deposit, to be used for this occasion from all points from which the local one way rate to Milwaukee is more than six dollars, also for all business routed via Chicago. From points from which the local one way rate to Milwaukee is six dollars or less, open form of local excursion ticket to be used with privilege of similar extension under same conditions, including payment of fee of fifty cents to joint agent at the time of the deposit of ticket.

Connecting lines—The above rates and arrangements to be tendered to connecting lines for basing purposes. The sale of tickets is so regulated as to require presentation at our gateways on the dates of sale authorized therefrom.

Additional notice—Every one purchasing a ticket to go to Milwaukee should obtain at the same time a certificate

which will be a voucher in obtaining return ticket. The fare is one fare, plus two dollars, except in certain instances, where the fare is only six dollars, then it is one fare and one-third. Article I., section 8. Each federated club of fifty members or less is entitled to representation by its president or her appointee only.

Each club of between fifty and one hundred members is entitled to representation by its president or her appointee and one delegate. For each additional one hundred members or majority fraction thereof, a club is entitled to one additional delegate.

The minimum representation of each state federation is five delegates.

Each state federation of over twenty-five clubs is entitled to one additional delegate for every twenty-five clubs or majority fraction thereof.

The open meeting of the woman's club of Lincoln last Monday afternoon was under the auspices of the parliamentary department. As usual, the leader, Mrs. Richardson, had prepared a unique program, referring to local conditions. On this occasion the school board received special attention. It was a reproduction of a regular school board meeting. The members of the board who were seated around a long table were Mesdames A. W. Field, M. D. Welch, S. H. Atwood, W. D. FitzGer-

ald, J. A. Piper, R. N. Herron and Miss Margaret Hallett, with Mrs. Nellie M. Richardson as president of the board. In calling attention to the fact that the board was composed entirely of women, Mrs. Richardson said this had become a necessity in the onward march of events, as it had been plainly demonstrated in Kentucky that men were too emotional to engage in public affairs. After the call to order, roll call, minutes, petitions and reports followed each other in rapid succession. The obstructionist, Mrs. Field, objected, interrupted and contradicted in the most approved manner—per Lincoln school board. Mrs. A. A. Scott, as superintendent of city schools, and Mrs. H. P. Eames, as high school principal, brought in highly interesting reports, while Mrs. McDonald and Mrs. Stull appeared as petitioners before the board. The fine hits made the affair most laughable and the situation seemed to be much appreciated by the audience.
