

The fewer the number of subscribers on each line the larger the cost, but competition has given the prople of Plattsmouth residence telephone connection at fifty cents a month.

At the present time there are about 800 telephones in operation in the city of Lincoln. The rates are too exorbitant for more common use. By the proposed reduction in prices the Independent company will have a list largely in excess of the present one, so that the people will receive two benefits, one a reduction of prices and the other an increase of phones. Business men, even if they have two phones, can talk to 2,500 persons for less than they now talk to about 800.
