The Lincoln Woman's club formally opened on Monday afternoon. The new president, Mrs. H. M. Bushnell, presided. It was entirely a business meeting. Reports were heard from the ladies of all the departments and from the delegates to the Mother's congress and to the biennial. Sorrow was expressed for the loss by death of Mrs. Anna B. Winchester, who had been a faithful member of the club and a worker in the art department.

The hours for the department meetings have not all been definitely arranged. Mrs. E. A. Burnett, leader of the history department, announced the first history lesson for Thursday, October 19th, at 3.30 P. M. Mrs. Eli

Plummer, leader in parliamentary law announced a meeting of her department at three o'clock on Tuesday of next week at the club rooms. Miss Hayden of the State university, leader of the art department, and her assistant, Mrs. F. M. Hall, both spoke enthusiastically of that department. Mrs. W. M. Morning offered a comprehensive plan for the current events department. The program for the first meeting will be devoted to a study of English methods of government, English elections, form of English government, and a character sketch of Queen Victoria. No one was present for the literature department. Mrs. Henry P. Eames, leader in music, spoke of her plans and said the meeting would be held the Friday afternoon of the week of the regular club meeting, at 2:30 P. M. in the club rooms. Mrs. Parie, leader of the French department announced that Madame Brooks had been secured as teacher and that a preliminary meeting would be held at two o'clock next Saturday.

Mrs. J. W. Johnson who was the club's delegate to the Mother's congress at Des Moines last spring presented a comprehensive review of the proceedings.

The report of the Milwaukee biennial was divided among several delegates and at the close Mrs. Bushnell wove into her address the important and interesting points that had been omit-

The noted speakers and the press meetings were among the topics briefly touched upon by the president herself. In closing Mrs. Bushnell said that she had found three types of members in the Woman's club, women who attended the open meetings but had no time for department studies; women who attended both the department and open meetings, and those who rarely attended any club meeting but retained their membership because of sympathy with the work. All three classes she warmly welcomed.

The next meeting will be in charge of Mrs. Henry P. Eames, who will give a musical.

The Fairbury Woman's Club re-assembled on Tuesday afternoon, October the second, for the beginning of the fifth years' work. The president, Mrs. J. B. McDowell, presided. There
