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Medical Associations.

The week has been diversified by the doctors who have been in state session. The streets have been dignified by gentlemen in beaver hats, and professional expressions. Wednesday evening the meeting was concluded by a banquet at the Lincoln, where one hundred doctors enjoyed feasting together. Dr. C. C. Gifford was toastmaster. The toasts: Dr. J. S. Foote, "The New Day;" Dr. R. P. McDonald, "The Woman and the Doctor;" Dr. J. A. Andrews, "Our Profession;" Dr. Jay G. Roberts, "We never Laugh;" Dr. George H. Simmons, "Medical Organization." Before the adjournment of the society the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Pres., Doctor W. B. Ely of Ainsworth; first vice pres., Mr. A. B. Anderson of Pawnee City; second vice pres., Doctor Schward; rec. sec., Doctor A. D. Wilkinson of Lincoln; corr. sec., Doctor H. Winnett Orr of Lincoln; treas., Dr. J. L. Greene, asylum.

The last day's program at the session of the homeopathic society surpassed all previous ones in interest and discussion. The papers: "Aural Complications of Infectious Diseases," Dr. E. B. Woodward; "Diabetes," Doctor C. G. Sprague, discussed by Doctors Bailey, Hanchett and Finney; "An Interesting Case in General Practice," Doctor E. A. Carr of Lincoln; "Cerebral Localization," Doctor Foote of Omaha, discussed by Doctors Cate, Finney, Schumacker and Hanchett; "Disease of the Meninges," Doctor B. F. Bailey of Lincoln, discussed by Doctors Merryman, Paine,

Finney, Carr, Schumaker and Sprague; "Melancholia and its Treatment," Dr. G. A. Young of Norfolk, read by Superintendent Frederick Teal of the Norfolk hospital for the insane and discussed by Doctors Sprague, Dorris and Bailey. Doctor Teal in this paper told about the treatment of the insane at the Norfolk asylum and said that at his institution, the homeopathic treatment was being given now in place of other systems. The last paper was by Doctor H. E. Kinyon of Fremont. After the program was concluded officers were selected for the year, as follows: Pres., Doctor E. N. Leake of Fremont; first vice pres., Doctor E. B. Finney of Lincoln; second vice pres., Doctor F. E. Way of Wahoo; sec., Doctor H. C. Miner of Falls City; treas., Doctor O. S. Wood of Omaha; member of board of censors, Doctor W. A. Cate or Nelson; members of the legislative committee, Doctor Benjamin F. Bailey of Lincoln; committee on life insurance examiners, Doctors Wood, Dorris and Foote.

The climax of the session was the trip made to Normal for the purpose of inspecting the new homeopathic sanitarium recently located in that place. This institution will occupy the building formerly used as a dormitory by students at the college.
