High-School Girls' Athletic Exhibit.

The members of the girls' gymnasium classes of the High school entertained their parents and friends with a short but very interesting exhibition on Thursday afternoon, May the sixteenth. The exhibition was given not as an entertainment to win applause but to show the patrons of the High school and the board of education what a gymnasium, when properly conducted, will do for the girls and also to show their appreciation of what the boare has done for them this year. The girls have worked hard and faithfully to make the gymnasium a credit to the High school, and the visitors admitted their success. A drill, in military marching, by the three o'clock class, followed by a wanddrill defined their growth in precision. A series of swings with the Indian clubs by the two-thirty class was excellent. The three o'clock class played the two-thirty class in games of beanbag and pass-ball, the three o'clock clase winning. The enthusiasm with which the girls play these games is seldom greater in a basket ball or even a foot ball match game with outsiders. The two-thirty class then gave a very pretty dumb-bell drill. All took part in the Swedish work, The program ended with a short game of basket ball between the team chosen from the classes and a team chosen from the two regular teams. Of course the basketball girls won the game 18 to 6. In spite of the fact that no extra time was given for practice the girls carried out their program without a blunder, is praiseworthy. To the gymnasium credit is due for the reports that have come from the girls who have heretofore been obliged to stop school in the spring on account of poor health, but since taking gymnasium work, they have been able to carry more studies, and keep up their work until the end of the echool year. It is sincerely hoped that next September something better in the way of a gymnasium may be offered to the girls and boys of the High school. Miss Spurck, the gymnasium director, is particularly [successful in corrective work and the agile, healthy beauty of the High school girls is partly due to her intelligent direction of their exercises.
