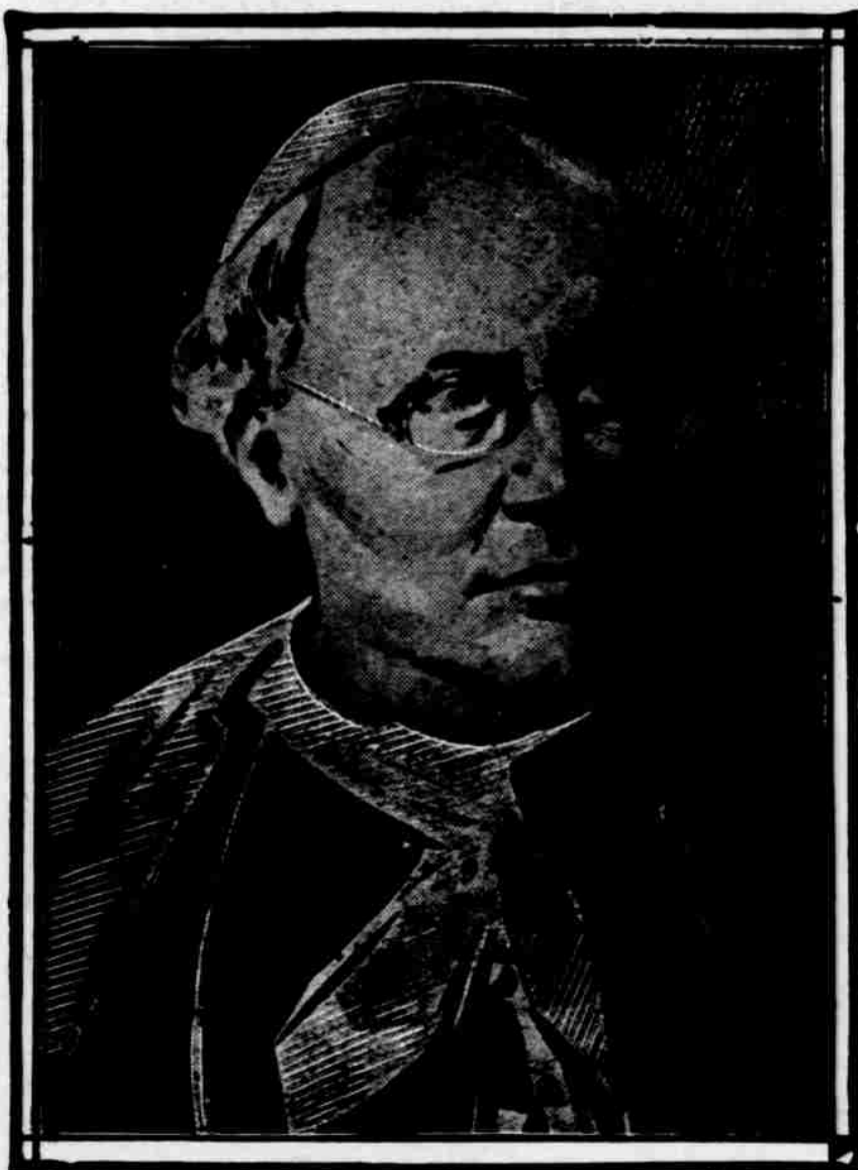
After a wedding breakfast the bride and groom will take the 10:30 train for Kansas City.
