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A STRONG PROTEST

The United States Monetary League has prepared a strong protest to congress against the recommendation made in the president's latest message. Joseph N. Stephens, secretary of the league, asks that this protest be supplemented by letters from those who approve of the protest, which letters should be addressed to senators and representatives. The president's recommendation was as follows: "The attention of congress should be especially given to the currency question, and

that the standing committees on the matter in the two houses charged with the duty take up the matter of our currency and see whether it is not possible to secure an agreement in the business world for bettering that system. The committees should consider the question of the retirement of the greenbacks and the problem of securing in our currency such elasticity as is consistent with safety. Every silver dollar should be made by law redeemable in gold at the option of the holder."

LIGHTNING ART WORK

On the breast of one of the two brothers killed in New York by lightning while bathing Sunday afternoon was imprinted a likeness of a tree. It was about eighteen inches long and was perfect even to the smallest details, including the coloring of the leaves. The likeness was burned deep in the flesh. Physicians are unable to explain this phenomenon, as there was no tree within several hundred feet of the spot where the lightning bolt struck. The ways of lightning

have long been past finding out.—Boston Globe.
