Double Volume of Sound.
The Duplex is the first and the only phonograph to collect the vibrations and get all the sound from both sides of the diaphragm.
Because the reproducer or sound box of the Duplex has two vibrating diaphragms and two horns (as you see) to amplify the sound from both sides of both diaphragms.
The Duplex, therefore, gives you all the music produced—with any other you use one-half.

The tension spring used in the old style reproducers to jerk the diaphragm back into position each time it vibrates, by its jerking pull roughens the fine wave groove in the record, and that causes the squeaking, squawking, harsh, the volume of metallic sound that sets your teeth on edge when you hear the old style phonograph.

The Duplex the wave grooves of the record remain perfectly smooth—there is nothing to roughen them—and the result is an exact reproduction of the original sound.

POLITICAL CONVENTIONS

The democratic state convention for Washington made nominations as follows:

For congressmen-at-large—Dr. P. S. Byrnes of Spokane, Dudley Eshelman of Tacoma, and William Blackman of Seattle.

Justices of the supreme court—Long term, C. W. Hodgeson of Hoquaim and E. C. Million of Seattle; short term, Warren Tolman of Spokane, and B. C. Sweeney of Seattle.

In the platform complimentary reference was made to Mr. Bryan.

The democratic state convention for New York in session at Buffalo, nominated the following ticket:

Governor—W. R. Hearst.
Lieutenant governor — Lewis S. Chanler.
Secretary of state—John S. Whalen.
Comptroller—Martin H. Glynn.
Treasurer—Julius Houser.
Surveyor—F. W. Keene.

Three of these, Messrs. Hearst, Chanler and Whalen, were nominees of the independence league which met prior to the democratic convention.

The substance of the platform adopted by the convention may be stated as follows:

"At this time, when the authority of democracy is invoked to defend plunder of the masses by a few rich men, through partial laws on one hand, and, on the other, to justify many extravagant and revolutionary proposals which if adopted must inevitably produce worse disasters than the abuses they seek to cure, we deem it eminently fitting to declare that the whole of democratic principles is embraced in the injunction laid on the first man—that in the sweat of their brows he and all his posterity must eat their bread. We affirm it to be as much the supreme duty of government to prevent any man from taking by violence, fraudulent device, or legislative favor one dollar—or its equivalent—produced by the labor of another man, as it is to protect every man in the enjoyment of all the property, however extensive, produced by his own labor. We therefore denounce republican high protection, which enables a few to plunder the whole body of their fellow citizens, by charging extortionate prices for the necessities of life and the essentials of industry.
"Every proposal that a municipality assume operation of all public utilities and reduce rates to persons using them, regardless of what the service may actually cost, is an attempt to force some men to bear the expenses of others; because where the outlay for operation exceeds earnings the deficit must be made up by taxation, and this would be socialistic, and therefore hostile to justice and subversive of democratic government. It is the duty of government, therefore, to ascertain the actual cost of operating all public service corporations and to fix from time to time reasonable rates for the service they perform.
"We demand the passage of such legislation as will deal effectively with the whole subject of life insurance and encourage this form of economy by making its fruits absolutely secure. We are resolved, above all, that every rogue who has aided in planning this plunder, who has connived at it or shared in its profits, shall be pursued by every punitive weapon of the law, wielded by honest, fearless, loyal public prosecutors.
"We ask the federal government to exercise its influence to bring about speedy cessation of the atrocities now being committed against the Jews in Russia.
"In common with the democrats of all the states and expressing the sentiment of the high-minded citizenship of the republic without party, we view with pride and satisfaction the hospitality and acclaim which have been

accorded, at home and abroad, to that great democratic leader and typical American, William Jennings Bryan, to whom the democrats of New York extend most cordial and sincere felicitations.

"Finally, we record our solemn belief that corruption in the public service or in corporate management can not be eradicated while schemes of plunder are implanted in the very body of the law itself. Where the law not only permits, but empowers great trusts to exact for their products from the people of this country prices vastly exceeding those asked in foreign countries, and this power to plunder

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
