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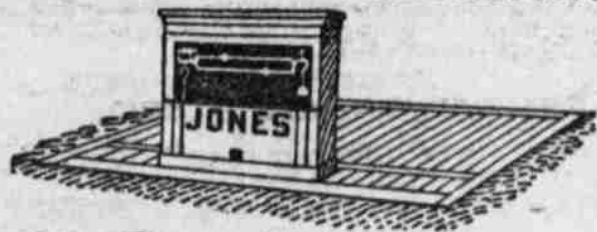
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October 27 he spoke at Athens, Lancaster, Circleville, Washington, C. H., Wilmington, Middle Junction, Middletown, Franklin, Miamisburg, Dayton, Troy, Piqua, Sidney, Versailles, Ansonia, Celina and Vanwert. On October 29 he spoke at Grinnell, Ia., in the afternoon, and at Des Moines in the evening. On Tuesday, October 30, Mr. Bryan began his final tour of Nebraska, speaking at Springfield in the afternoon and at South Omaha in the evening. Wednesday morning he began his tour of the Third congressional district, taking a special train provided by the congressional committee, and being accompanied by the democratic candidate for congress, Judge Graves. Wednesday he spoke at Wahoo, Fremont, Hooper, Scribner, West Point, Beemer, Pilger, Stanton and Norfolk. On Thursday he spoke at Battle Creek, Meadow Grove, Tilden, Oakdale, Petersburg, Albion, Neligh, Clearwater, Ewing, Atkinson and O'Neill.

Mr. Bryan's itinerary for the remainder of the campaign beginning with November 2, the date of this issue is in Nebraska, and is as follows, the time of each address being given:

"DREAMER" AND "OBJECTOR"

I have read an account of one of Senator Beveridge's speeches in the Chicago Record-Herald in which he says that Mr. Bryan is a dreamer, but that President Roosevelt does things. Yes I suppose the president does do things. I notice he has been trying to carry out some of Mr. Bryan's dreams and people praise him more for that than most anything else that he has done. When I say people I do not mean corporation people. When a republican says people they generally mean those few people who control the wealth of the country. I do not think they regard ordinary human beings as people.

Mr. Beveridge also says that Mr. Bryan is an objector. Well to look at it from his standpoint I suppose that means that he is a bad man; Mr. Beveridge is an objector also, but of a different kind. He objects to punishing those who commit frauds on the people, especially when those frauds are committed by the trust corporations; he objects to government ownership of railroads; but I have never heard of any objections that he has made to the government granting the railroads enough land, the sale of which must have paid the price of several railroads. He objects to reducing the tariff on the necessities of life, when he knows that it benefits only a few millionaires, while it is contrary to everything that goes to make up a republican form of government. Would it not be a good plan for the people of his state, the state of Benjamin Harrison; the state which was the home of Thomas A. Hendricks; the state where D. W. Voorhees, the Tall Sycamore of the Wabash, for so many years represented the people, insist that Mr. Beveridge do a little dreaming and also a little objecting? Indiana had a man who, for many, many years, was a member of congress from one Indiana district called the watch dog of the

treasury; to anyone who had lived long in the state it would not be necessary to mention his name. It was "Bill" Holman. He was always ready to champion the cause of the people, I mean the common people. I think he was also called the objector; will the people of Indiana forget him?

Now there is no watch dog in congress it seems; there is no one to object to republicans purloining the insurance policyholders' money to buy votes with; if there be such they are so weak voiced that we do not hear of them any more. What we want is a good dreamer, a good strong objector in the White House, and a good many of them in congress. Although President Roosevelt has found a few of the plunderers gully he never even dreams of punishing any of them; he seems to think all that is necessary is to let the people know who the guilty ones are. I myself think it is good to let us know who is robbing us. I also think we will settle with a few of them. One would hardly think that a man who had been found guilty would put himself up for office again, but we have some who have such contempt for the people that have the hardihood to do so.

The Commoner is doing a great good and I hope it will continue to blow its bugle horn until everyone of the rascals have been driven out and honest men put in their places whether they be so called democrats, republicans or what not.

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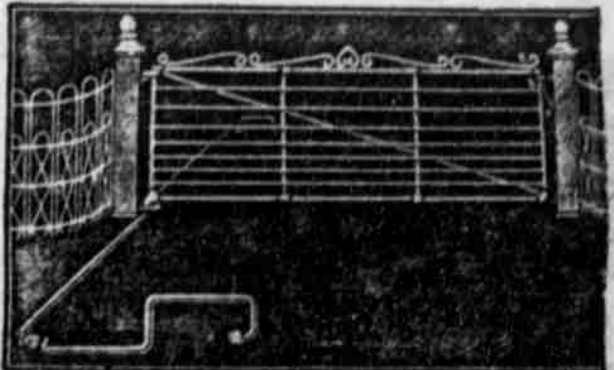
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
