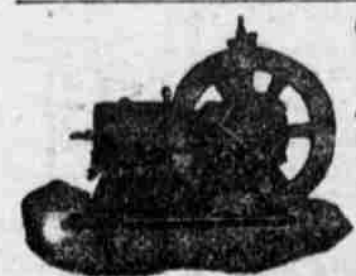

Governor Sheldon of Nebraska has signed the two-cent fare bill.

Concerning the employment of contract Chinese labor on the Panama canal, the following statement has been issued from the war department: "In view of the conditions which have taken place in the management of the isthmian canal, the persons making bids for Chinese labor, long pending, have been notified that no action will be taken in respect to them; that they are released from any obligation under their bids, and if occasion arises for a renewal of bids for Chinese labor they will be notified."

A joint resolution proposing an amendment to the state constitution so as to authorize a twenty-five million dollar bond issue for good roads has been favorably reported to the lower house of the Pennsylvania legislature.

The street railway trouble at Louisville will be arbitrated.

Both houses in Missouri passed the bill for nominating senators by direct vote.

The North Dakota legislature has enacted a two and one-half-cent railroad passenger fare bill and an anti-pass bill.

The consolidation of two large paper companies in the province of Quebec and the control of 250,000 acres of timber land on the St. Francis river through the efforts of American capitalists is announced.

Four Greeks employed on the Tide Water railroad near Roanoke, Va., were struck by a Norfolk & Western freight train, and killed.

The jury in the case of Steve Adams on trial at Wallace, Idaho, for the murder of Fred Tyler was unable to agree and has been discharged. The prosecution declares that Adams will be put on trial again but not sooner than the next term of court which begins in October. The case is intimately connected with that of Moyer and Haywood.
