



A Dover, Del., dispatch says: "Lying in a marshy piece of land the body of little Horace N. Marvin, the four-year-old son of Dr. H. N. Marvin, whose mysterious disappearance from the Bay Meadow farm, near Dover, had baffled solution since March 4, was found about half a mile from the Marvin farm today by Ollie Pleasanton, a farmer. Pleasanton, who lives on a farm adjoining the Marvins, came upon the body while out gunning. The child lay face downward in a patch of meadow grass. From cursory examination there was not a mark upon the little boy's body. It was in a good state of preservation."

While Mrs. Roosevelt was entertaining at luncheon on board the naval yacht Sylph, the vessel collided with a naval tug. A flag pole was dismantled and fell on the deck where Mrs. Roosevelt stood. It was a narrow escape for the president's wife.

Charles S. Fairchild, secretary of the treasury under Grover Cleveland, was arraigned in New York's criminal court on the charge of forgery in connection with insurance matters.

F. W. Brown, democrat, was re-elected mayor of the city of Lincoln, Neb.

A pitched battle between strike breakers and strikers, took place at San Francisco. Eight men were shot, among them two officers. Several of them will die.

The Iowa supreme court has held in the case of Bergstrom vs. the Rhode Island Railroad company that the general public has a right to suppose that a baggagemaster is the proper person to determine in what manner a trunk should be shipped and that its acceptance by him as baggage incurs a liability on the railroad company. The supreme court points out the universal custom of railroads in carrying commercial travelers' "sample" trunks as baggage to show that they do not limit baggage to "personal effects." If a baggagemaster receives for transportation articles not ordinarily regarded as "personal effects" the carrier will be bound by his acts unless the person is advised that he is exceeding his authority in checking the trunks as "baggage."

An Associated Press cablegram from Paris says: "M. Kurino, the Japanese minister, in an interview today is quoted as making the important statement that the series of treaties between Great Britain, France, Russia and Japan, guaranteeing the territorial status quo in the far east, implied an agreement to prevent other countries from acquiring territory there. Minister Kurino denied that the Franco-Japanese entente was in any way aimed at the United States, adding: 'Japan in spite of the San Francisco incident, has always been most sympathetic to the United States because she was the first to treat the Japanese people on a footing of equality. If Japan could obtain advantages from an understanding with the United States it is entirely probable that the government at Tokio would not hesitate to negotiate with Washington.' M. Kurino said that as Germany had no possessions in the far east, Kiao Chou being simply leased Chinese ground, a treaty with her similar to the one between Japan and France would be useless."

The English government's Irish bill passed the house of commons with a vote of 416 to 121. Some of its provisions are: Establishment of an administrative council (parliament) of 106 members at Dublin; 32 elected, 24 nominated by king; term of office, three years. Council to control board of local government, agriculture, public works, national education and reformatory institutions. Imperial government to retain control of supreme court, constabulary, Dublin police, land commission and prison board. Resolutions to require approval of lord-lieutenant. Special administrative fund of \$20,000,000 to be paid to a special Irish treasury.

At least one hundred of the passengers and crew on the steamship Poitou were drowned.

The Chicago Journal prints a story seeking to show that Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, who was about to be tried at Boise, Idaho, for complicity in the killing of former Governor Stuenenberg served a term for burglary in 1886 in the Illinois penitentiary at Joliet. Moyer denies that he is the same party and it is claimed that this is a false charge made by the Pinkertons.

On May 9 a son was born to the king and queen of Spain. There was great rejoicing throughout the kingdom.

Senator Platt of New York says he will not be a candidate for re-election to the senate. Incidentally he says that he selected Mr. Roosevelt, on the latter's return from Cuba, as a republican candidate for governor of New York.
