"The utter incapacity of a republican administration, dominated by a plutocracy and imperialistically directed to legislate for the people is marked by the failure of the party in power at Washington to check exploitation of the masses for the benfit of the few. There has been noisy denunciation and sporadic prosecution of a few selected victims to divert attention from the main question, but in the face of practically unanimous demand of press and people, not one effective step has been taken towards the destruction of that fruitful mother of trusts, the high protective tariff.

"We commend these thoughts to the attention of the delegates to the national convention of the democratic party to be held in Denver July 7, 1908, and we call upon them to do all in their power to bring forth from that convention results that will appeal alike to the common sense and patriotism of the people as a prelude to a sweeping democratic victory in November.

"We commend the demands of organized labor upon congress for the enactment of immediate legislation preservatory of the rights of the toiler as an American citizen.

"We favor the enactment into law in the state of Illinois and by the congress of the United States of the democratic idea for the protection of depositors in all banks by a law similar to the one enforced in the great democratic state of Oklahoma, whereby the depositor is insured against the loss of his deposit by failure of the bank or otherwise.
