A member of congress has actually introduced a resolution in reference to these charges. I therefore lay all the facts before you."

Here the president recites the various charges, including those against Charles P. Taft, brother of William H. Taft, and Douglas Robinson, the president's brother-in-law, of participation in the \$40,000,000 purchase fund and proceeds, saying:

"These statements sometimes appeared in the editorials; sometimes in the shape of contributions from individuals, either unknown or known to be of bad character. They are false in every particular from beginning to end. The wickedness of the slanders is only surpassed by their fatuity. So utterly baseless are resent in part merely material collected for campaign purposes, and in part stories originally concocted with a view of possible blackmail.
