THE CONFERENCE AT SARATOGA

The conference of New York democrats advertised for Saratoga met at the appointed time. The Commoner gives its readers the story of this conference from the Associated Press report:

Saratoga, N. Y., September 9.—Out of the democratic conference which began a two days' session here today under the guiding hands of men who hold a prominent place in the party's history, there promises to grow a permanent organization to be known as "the democratic league." At the close of a day of democratic oratory during which speeches were made by Alton B. Parker, Thomas M. Osborn and Thomas F. Shepard, outlining the hopes of the conference, John N. Carlisle of Watertown offered the following resolution:

"That for the purpose of aiding and strengthening the democratic party, bringing back to its ranks those who have been separated from it, and attracting to it the independent and the young voters of the state; offering a place of refuge for those republicans who feel that their trust in their party has been betrayed and its solemn pledges and its promises to them broken; who deprecate its wastefulness and extravagance in administering the affairs of government and look with apprehension upon the steady strides it is making towards the centralization of government at the expense of the legitimate powers of the states and of the rights reserved to the people and of the right of disseminating the principles of the democratic party—the efforts of this conference should be continued and for that purpose its organization be made permanent. Therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the members of this conference and those who may hereafter become such be and they are hereby constituted a permanent organization under the name of "the democratic league," and that the present executive committee be continued in office until otherwise ordered by the general committee hereinafter provided for."

It is also provided that the executive committee shall call a meeting of the general committee on or before February 1, 1910.

The resolution was referred to the "committee on plan and scope," composed of a representative from each of the senatorial districts of the state. The members of this committee were chosen tonight by the delegates from the various counties comprising the districts, and probably will be reported and approved at tomorrow's session of the conference. This committee is also charged with the formulation of a "declaration of party principles" to be presented for consideration tomorrow.

Two sessions of the conference, one this afternoon and another tonight, were attended by over 400 delegates.

Tonight's meeting was addressed by ex-Justice D. Cady Herrick of Albany and ex-Justice Augustus Van Wyck, both of whom have carried the party's standard in gubernatorial campaigns and by John Sayles of Buffalo.

Samuel Tilden, second, of New Lebanon, Columbia county, a nephew of the late Samuel J. Tilden, called the gathering to order and named Alton B. Parker as temporary chairman. Judge Parker was enthusiastically cheered as he was escorted to the platform.

Secretary Francis A. Willard's reading of the conference call which followed, was frequently interrupted by cheers.

Thomas M. Osborn, chairman of the executive committee, after he had proposed rules for the confer-

ence proceedings, which were adopted, addressed the gathering.

At the conclusion of his speech Mr. Osborn named Edward M. Shepard as permanent chairman.

At the evening session, which opened at 8:40 o'clock, Chairman Shepard read a telegram from W. J. Bryan. The message, dated Kennedy, Texas, was addressed to "the democratic conference at Saratoga," and read:

"I trust the conference will strengthen the party by straightforward declaration in favor of principles and policies acceptable to the rank and file of the party throughout the land. I am hoping for strong endorsement of the income tax, for specific demand for free raw material and substantial reduction of tariff on manufactured articles."

"W. J. BRYAN."

Though the men enlisted in the "peace movement" disclaim any factional object, the personnel of the conference is such as to strengthen
