DISAPPOINTING REPUBLICANS

Mr. Bryan's latest utterance on the wool schedule must be keenly disappointing to the republicans. The great Nebraskan was so earnestly in favor of free raw wool and so insistent upon the democratic house going the limit in dealing with that article that protectionists had hopes he would refuse to accept the Underwood programme. Such expectations fall to the ground. Mr. Bryan accepts the ruling of the democrats in the house. He says in reply to an inquiry for his opinion: "The bill is better than any republican bill we have ever had. The only objection that I have to it is that it does not go far enough. I believe it would have been better if they had put wool on the free schedule and made a greater reduction in the rates on woolen goods than they did. A democrat can criticize it for not going far enough while rejoicing that it went as far as it did." Mr. Bryan is not quarreling with the party, and the party can not quarrel with him for thus expressing himself.—Columbia (S. C.) "The State."
