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NEW YORK DEMOCRATS IN LINE

Governor Dix was defeated for re-nomination in the New York democratic state convention. Following is an Associated Press report:

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 2.—Alton B. Parker took the opportunity offered by his speech today as permanent chairman of the democratic state convention to answer his critics at the Baltimore convention. It was the first political speech the former presidential candidate had made since he was the storm center of the battle waged at Baltimore by William J. Bryan against his selection as temporary chairman of that gathering. In defending himself he also defended the New York state delegation, which also was the object of Mr. Bryan's most fervid attacks. Mr. Parker said the action of the New York delegates at Baltimore was dictated by the desire to promote harmony.

"You may ask me," he said, "why did the New York delegation, with ninety men, at least twenty-five of whom were capable of entering upon that platform, fall to discuss the attack which was made indirectly and directly upon the democrats and upon myself—why did they keep silent? Because we believed it was better that we should suffer a little indignity than enter into a dispute with the gentleman upon the platform (Mr. Bryan), which would divide that convention in two and we held our peace.

"We held our peace for the good of democracy; we held our peace believing that either Clark or Wilson would be nominated, and we determined that New York state should take no part in that contest which

would prevent the people of the United States from uniting, all together, to elect whichever one of them should be the nominee of the party."

Mr. Parker's defense was called forth by the opposition to his candidacy for the permanent chairman, expressed by Delegate Frank H. Mott of Jamestown and Mayor John K. Sague of Poughkeepsie, which declared Mr. Parker to be reactionary. He was chosen chairman, however, by a vote of 412 to 35, most of the opposing votes being cast by those delegates identified with the movements against Charles F. Murphy and Tammany hall.

The first words of Mr. Parker's speech were: "I am a progressive democrat."

In further reply to his critics at both the national and state conventions, he said:

"It is true, as one of the distinguished gentlemen said here today, that there was a suggestion at Baltimore that I was put forward to represent Thomas F. Ryan of New York. There have been attempts made to reindorse a statement made at the time of the Baltimore convention that Thomas F. Ryan had selected his attorney, Elihu Root to preside as the temporary chairman of the republican national convention and that he likewise had chosen another attorney of his, Alton B. Parker, to be temporary chairman of the Baltimore convention and make the keynote speech. There is no client that I ever had that could control my political action.

"But further than that, Thomas F. Ryan was never my client and never paid me a dollar for services in his life. Four years ago the distinguished gentleman whose name has been mentioned here (Mr. Bryan) was not only in opposition to me as a candidate, but against me personally, was good enough to write me a letter thanking me for my contribution to the democratic platform. He was good enough to write me inviting me to Lincoln; he was good enough afterwards to accept my invitation to visit me at Esopus. He requested the national committee, as our distinguished friend and chairman and member of the national committee knows, that I should render service as I could on the stump and wherever I was asked to go by that committee in ten states in all. I attempted to lift my voice and to work in behalf of that ticket."

The platform ratifies the democratic national platform, pledges its support to Wilson and Marshall and condemns what it styles as the "monopolistic tariff evils" of the republican party.

"Under the false plea of protection to the American farmer and the American workmen," the platform says: "The republican party has taxed the necessities of life for the benefit of the favored private enterprises. The failure of the American people to obtain relief through a downward revision of the tariff is due entirely to a republican senate and to President Taft. Such revision can be obtained only by the election of a democratic president and a democratic house of representatives."

Governor Dix's administration is described as clean, efficient and economical.

The platform pledges the legislature to provide for a constitutional convention to pass on the initiative, the referendum and the short ballot and declares in favor of submitting the women suffrage amendment to the people "as soon as possible."

The democratic state convention was thrown into an uproar today by an oratorical attack upon Charles F. Murphy, the Tammany leader, by Thomas M. Osborn of Auburn, who long has been identified with the forces to dislodge Mr. Murphy and his friends from their position of

prominence in the party in New York state.

The occasion was a discussion of the party platform which Mr. Osborn wanted to amend in certain important particulars. Mr. Murphy's friends accused Mr. Osborn of being actuated in his attack by disappointment over his failure to be chosen as the party candidate for governor or United States senator.

When Mr. Osborn opened fire he was interrupted at almost every sentence by hoots and questions from the delegates.

"His hour is about to strike," he said, referring to the Tammany leader. "The delayed storm which conditions in New York city long have been preparing, already has burst, the lightning already is flaming and already one great reputation has come crashing to the ground. And this man who sits here now, surrounded by satellites, dispensing favors, dictating policies and distributing the nominations of a great party—look at him well, for this is the last time you will look upon such a scene. For him, too, the hour soon will strike, and upon the ruins of this fall will arise the New York democracy of the future.

"Choose ye this day whom ye will serve. On the one side stands Woodrow Wilson and the principles of the progressive democracy; on the other Charles F. Murphy and the cohesive power of public plunder."

A storm of jeers and hisses followed Mr. Osborn as he left the platform.

William Sulzer, representative in congress from New York city, was nominated for governor early this morning by the democratic state convention. It was the seventh time he had been a candidate for this nomination. Mr. Sulzer was formally declared the choice of the party on the fourth ballot, after the name of Governor Dix had been withdrawn.

Martin H. Glynn was nominated for lieutenant governor. The convention then adjourned until today.

When Chairman Parker called the convention to order this evening, Robert E. Whalen put in nomination Martin H. Glynn of Albany for governor, and Augustus Thomas, the playwright, nominated Congressman William Sulzer. Mr. Thomas declared "no party ever offered to the earnest people of the state a man so consistently their champion as this
