eighteen inches deep should be filled with concrete. If sand and cement is used to fill the trench, the mixture should be in the proportion of one part cement to four parts of sand. If the sand contains coarse gravel, one part of cement and five parts of sand should be used. This concrete curb should extend above the ground a foot or two, to protect the silo from wash water. When the concrete has settled for twenty-four hours, excavation of the inside of the pit can safely be commenced.

The diameter of the pit, including the coating of cement, should be even at every point with the inside of the curb to permit an even settling of the silage. After the pit has been dug to a depth of five feet the walls should be carefully trimmed and given a coating of cement. This coating should be at least one-inch in thickness. By coating the walls of the pit as it is dug, no scaffolding will be necessary. An ordinary block and tackle and bucket can be used for removing dirt when the pit becomes too deep for handling by shovel. A cement flooring will serve to make the pit air tight and keep out seep water.

**TEST YOUR COWS**

The basis of all successful dairying of the present day is cow testing. Each cow should be tested at least once a week for quantity and quality of milk, for only in this way can the poor cows that eat up the profits be detected from the profitable producers. It is much better to have six good cows than twelve poor or medium ones. The Babcock test will enable any farmer to determine the value of each cow's milk as easily as an expert chemist. No farmer who owns a herd of cows, no matter how small, can afford to be without one unless he belongs to a test association. While it is true that a large majority of dairy farmers have not used the Babcock test on their farms, it is a remarkable fact when it is considered that this test is the only method yet discovered by which the actual value of a dairy cow can be accurately determined. Not all dairymen, however, are thus neglectful, and those who have adopted this testing method are now reaping the fruits of their progressiveness in the possession of more valuable herds and larger returns in milk production. The painstaking farmer who is practical usually experiences no difficulty in determining the actual value of his cows when he uses the test. It enables him to distinguish the good from the medium, the medium from the poor, and thus makes it easy for him to get rid of the unprofitable animals. By this test animals that are believed to be good will be shown to possess little merit, while some that are considered unprofitable will show that they are possessed of superior dairy qualities. Weigh the milk from each cow once a week and test it.

**PASTEURIZING MILK**

The dairy division of the department of agriculture has been conducting experiments to determine the best way of pasteurizing milk so as to kill the disease germs and yet not give the milk a cooked flavor or lessen its nutritive value. Pasteurizing at low temperatures was found to be more satisfactory than pasteurizing at high temperatures. When milk is pasteurized at 145 degrees F, instead of the usual temperature of 164 degrees F, it was found that the chemical changes are so slight that it is unlikely that the protein (muscle building element) or the phosphates of lime and magnesia are rendered less digestible than they are in raw milk. Therefore, the department recommends that when market milk is pasteur-

ized it should be heated to about 145 degrees F, and held at that temperature for about thirty minutes.

**HARVESTING SEED CORN**

Every corn crop starts with the gathering of the seed in the fall. If a good corn crop is wanted in 1914 it is time to lay plans for it now. The difference in yield of next year's corn crop resulting from seed gathered at the proper time in the proper way, and the seed as ordinarily handled, may mean many bushels per acre. The best time to gather seed corn is before the first killing frost, which in the northern sections comes from the 10th to the 20th of this month. In a normal season if the corn is acclimated it should be far enough along toward maturity so that good seed can be gathered at this time. Most farmers know that to get best results from seed corn, it should be gathered before it is ready for husking. When the large proportion of the earlier ears show the dent beginning to harden, the seed-corn day has arrived. The best part of the field should be worked first, examining every hill with the eye, at least. Whenever a desirable ear is found it should be gathered, providing it is produced on a hill that has a full stand of corn. No seed ear should be gathered from hills of corn with less than three well developed stalks. It will be noticed that the larger and more fully developed ears are produced on the hills that have one or two stalks. It is considered undesirable to use these ears for seed as their size can be accounted for from the fact that they had less competition in life, rather than an inherent tendency to produce heavily.

**AVOID CLODS IN THE SOIL**

A clod is inert or dead soil, because the bacteria have ceased their activities or are greatly hindered in their work of rendering insoluble mineral and organic matter in the soil soluble and available to the roots of plants. Clods annually do a vast amount of damage to crops. At this time of the year they are formed by the wholesale in the stubble fields that are allowed to lie undisturbed for months after the crops have been removed. After the harvest but little vegetation grows in the stubble fields, especially in a dry year, so the soil dries out very rapidly. It cracks on top, and this increases the rapidity of the soil moisture waste, resulting in the rapid formation of clods. Late fall and early spring rains may dissolve these clods, but the soil has been deprived of an enormous amount of plant food that might have been made available for next year's crops had not the clod condition prevented the soil bacteria from doing their work, which at this time of the year are the best, cheapest and most willing workers the farmer has. When soil conditions are unfavorable the soil bacteria do not work, and they never make up for lost time when they do work. Clod formation can be prevented by using the disc on stubble ground before plowing. The sooner it is used after harvest the better. Use it enough to get the soil loose on top. This loose layer will prevent the soil from cracking and keep a large amount of the water from escaping. In addition to this, when plowing begins the furrow slice will be in the best possible condition for making close connection with the bottom of the furrow and thus re-establishing good capillary action in a short time. This is of very great importance if the land is to be seeded to winter wheat. If clods form, as they do under the most favorable conditions, the time to break them up is when the soil is fresh, moist and friable. The fundamental point
