SENATE VOTES ON WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Following is a press dispatch, dated Washington, March 19: The Chamberlain joint resolution to submit to the states a constitutional amendment providing for woman suffrage was lost in the senate today. The vote was 35 to 34 in favor of the resolution, but as a two-thirds vote was necessary the resolution was beaten.

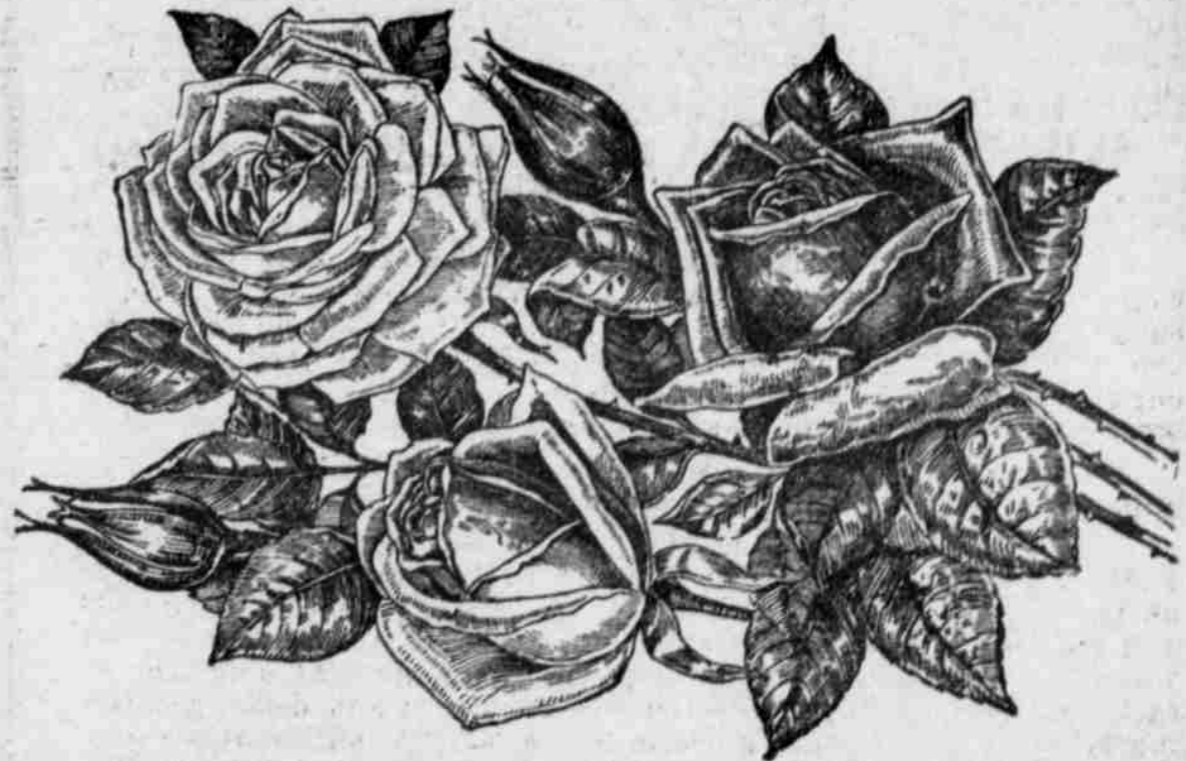

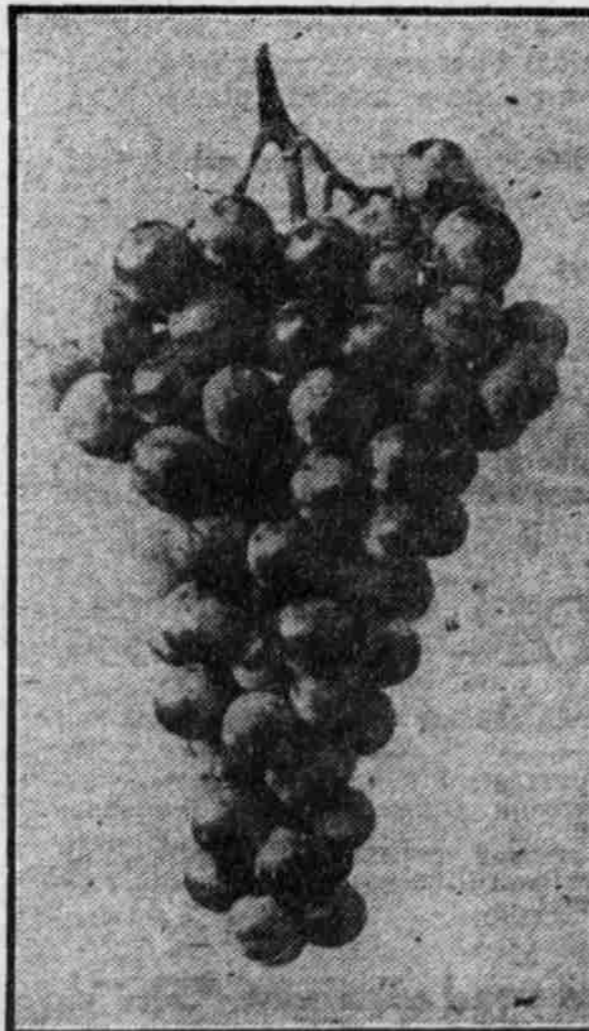
