Tiger, Husker netmen play tie matches

Nebraska and Missouri netters played tennis all afternoon at the Lincoln Tennis club courts yesterday, and when they got through they were exactly where they had started, for the two teams tied, 3 to 3.

In the four singles matches, the Cornhuskers and Tigers each won two. Each team also captured a doubles match.

Nebraska's Keith Howard defeated Charles Yates, 8-6, 6-1, and James Hensworth beat Jack Hudkins of Missouri, 3-6, 7-5, 12-10, in a close match. Harry Ankeny and Leon Davis were the Huskers who dropped their matches.

Bill Reisenberg and Harry Ankeny teamed to defeat Yates and Hudkins, 6-1, 7-5, but Dreyer and Gerdes evened the score with a 6-3, 6-2 victory over David and Howard.

Orrin Schneider, sensational AGR pitcher, finished his intramural softball career Friday by hanging up his sixth consecutive victory of the season, against no losses, as Alpha Gamma Rho defeated Sigma Alpha Epsilon, with Harold Osborne on the mound, in the championship game 7-3.

The steady pitching of Schneider, coupled with power hitting that produced three runs in the first inning, brought the AGR's their second consecutive intramural softball championship.

Schneider, one of the best softball chucksers to hurl on the campus, chalked up 16 strikeouts to bring his season's total in intramural competition to 74, an all-time record.

Not until the last half of the seventh, when the big pitcher, coasting in on a 7-run lead, eased up, did the Sig Alphas put together two hits, an error and some loose ball handling by the AGR infield, to make their 3 runs. Schneider squelched the rally, and the game was over.

Lindgren hits home run.

Lindgren, AGR second baseman, got the game's only home run in the third, a line drive down the third base line.

Fielding gem of the game was a running catch of a hard line drive by Ludwick, Sig Alpha short fielder. He just managed to get his glove on AGR catcher Jerry Voigt's drive over second to cut short a rally. Voigt hit a double first time up to bring in the AGR's first run. The Sig Alphas played errorless ball as they gave Osborne perfect support. They contributed several heads-up plays, keeping on their toes all the time.

Schneider fanned the first man to face him, but broke his season's record of giving no walks when he gave a free pass to the second Sig Alpha to come up. Then up came Osborne to hit a short fly into right field that fell safe for a hit. Osborne overran the man ahead of him at third, who was caught between third and home. Schneider fanned the next batter to end the rally and hold

the Sig Alphas in check until the sixth, when they got a man as far as third, but couldn't get him home.

The champions played the same steady ball Friday that brought them the championship of their league and a 2-0 victory over Farm House in the semifinals Wednesday night.

Wilbur Knight's baseballers haven't had too successful a season thus far this year, but they've made the sports editor of the Iowa State Daily eat his words.

The words ye Iowa editor columned before Nebraska's recent invasion of Ames were to the effect that the Iowans should have a cinch since the Huskers hadn't won any games all year. In fact, he didn't think Nebraska would even come close.

In their first series at Ames, the Iowans could get no better than a split, and at Lincoln this weekend, they did the same.

All of which goes to prove that sports editors should be seen and not heard, or at least shouldn't start blowing until the game has been played.

But although they did get the laugh on one sports editor, that's about the extent of the UN laughing.

The two game series with California Tuesday and Wednesday will end the Cornhuskers' most disastrous diamond season in years. Bad weather, eligibility troubles, even the draft board and some other bad breaks gave the Huskers a slow start, and they found it hard to get going. Their two wins over Iowa State were Nebraska's only victories in the Big Six campaign which left them in the league cellar.

Prospects for next year? Well, who knows? Last year, everything pointed to a fairly good baseball season this year and then, things began to happen. However, with Sid Held and Angie Ossino, two top-notch pitchers, and a number of sophomores and juniors getting a lot of experience in their losses this year, Nebraska's chances for the spring of '42 don't look too dark. Especially when you take into consideration the many good boys on Johnny McDermott's freshman squad.

And prospects for even farther ahead? A good sample of what to expect in the way of baseball at Nebraska was given here for the past three days when the state high school baseball tournament was in full swing. Diamond hopes might brighten up greatly if a lot of the high school kids here this week would continue their baseball careers at Nebraska.

After all, there's no reason why Nebraska should stay permanently in the Big Six baseball basement. It's absurd to cry for championships in every sport, but Nebraska just doesn't look right on the bottom of any league.

LeMaster, Ossino lead baseballers in 3-2 win over Iowa State

Bernie LeMaster and Angelo Ossino shared the honors yesterday as they led Nebraska's baseballers to a 3 to 2 win over Iowa State and gave the Huskers an even split in the two-game series played here. Iowa State trounced UN, 6 to 1, in the first game Friday afternoon.

It was LeMaster's homerun in the last of the tenth that saved the day for Nebraska and Ossino who scattered nine Iowa hits. Little Angie contributed three hits himself and knocked in the tying run in the ninth.

The Huskers got off on the right foot with a run in the first inning as a result of Ryan's walk, a stolen base and Ernie Swanson's single. Iowa State tied the score in the fifth.
