Linebackers remember Miller from high school

Most Husker fans remember Oklahoma State University's (OSU) halfback Terry Miller from his encounters with "Big Red" during the past two seasons.

In 1975, Miller rushed 20 times for 90 yards and three touchdowns in the Husker's 28-20 victory over the Cowboys. Last season Miller rushed for 149 yards on 30 carries and one touchdown in a 14-10 loss to the

However, two Huskers, linebackers Lee Kunz and Bruce Dunning, have memories of the Cowboy speedster

Both teams put emphasis on game, and not on Hipp-Miller rushing duel

From the sound of things, one might think Husker I-back I.M. Hipp and Oklahoma State University's (OSU) halfback Terry Miller will duel with footballs at 20 paces Saturday in Stillwater, Okla.

Miller and Hipp, however, will be carrying the ball for

their respective teams, not throwing it.

Miller and Hipp rank first and second respectively in the Big 8 and third and fourth in the nation in rushing. Miller has rushed for 1,043 yards for a 149.0 yards per game average. Hipp has 958 yards for a 138.9 yards per

The emphasis for both teams is on the game, not the

rushing duel.

"As far as I'm concerned, there is no duel," Miller said. "There nothing I can do about Mr. Hipp and there's nothing he can do about me. The game's on TV (ABC-TV) so I just hope we can win."

All-time rusher

Miller became the league's all-time rusher last week when he rushed for 149 yards against the University of Kansas (KU). That gave Miller a career mark of 4,117 yards, breaking the old record of Joe Washington of the University of Oklahoma who had 4,071. Miller is the only Big 8 running back in history to gain 1,000 yards in three seasons in a career.

Husker quarterback Tom Sorley said UNL will not

center its defense on Miller.

"We don't worry about any one individual," Sorley said. "But we do have a lot of respect for Terry Miller. "I guess the press in Oklahoma have really been building up for this game because they see it as a chance for Miller to gain his Heisman Trophy. They figure a good performance against us by him will virtually get it for

But Sorley said UNL head coach Tom Osborne doesn't want Miller to have the type of game against the Huskers "that would win the Heisman Trophy for him."

Pass-run balance

Sorley said the Huskers will be looking for more of a pass-run balance in their offensive attack this weekend. Last week against the University of Colorado, UNL hit only five of 21 passes for 90 yards. The Huskers' rushed for 390 yards.

"I don't know what the problem was last week," Sorley said. "We didn't throw well or catch well. We continue to work on our passing game but you need to have a running game, too.

"You can't rely on passing all the time. We did stay after practice to work on passing this week."

The Cowboys will be led by third-string quarterback Randy Stephenson who took over for OSU when injuries sidelined first and second team quarterbacks early in the

Both teams are 2-1 in conference play and trail the league's leader, Oklahoma, by one game.

Sorley, who will start at quarterback for the Huskers, said UNL will play its remaining games as if it were for the national championship.

"We've been working real hard and from now on we'll play one game at a time," Sorley said. "There's only one thing I'm tired of and that's losing. I don't want anymore

Dunning, a second string linebacker, played against Miller the first game of the 1973 season. Dunning's Arvada West High School team defeated Mitchell 28-21.

Dunning, who was starting at both center and linebacker for Arvada West, said Miller rushed between 150 and 180 yards in the game.

"We really didn't stop him," Dunning said. "it wasn't much of a defensive game. He was the mainstay of their team for two years in a row.

"He ran away from us most of the game. He was the best player I have ever played against in high school. He is a great, great running back."

Kunz also has memories of playing against Miller. In his junior year (1973), Wheatridge High School in Lakewood, Colo., defeated Mitchell High School for the Colorado AAA State Football championship.

"He was something else," Kunz said. "He broke one for about 80 yards against us. He usually had about one of those a game."

In the championship game, Miller scored Mitchell's only touchdown in a 26-6 loss.

"He was extremely quick," Kunz said of Miller. "If he didn't run around you, he would run over you. He was very strong, he's probably the best I've ever seen.

Miller is one of the leading candidates for the Heisman Trophy, given annually to the best college football player in the country.

He rushed for more than 2,000 yards and scored 37 touchdowns his senior year.

Last week against the University of Kansas, Miller became the leading rusher in Big 8 Conference history with a 149 yard performance to push his career total to 4,117 yards. It marked his third consecutive season over the 1,000 yard mark, another Big 8 record.

Top frats play for first place

"We would like a chance to play them (Thunderchickens) but everybody wants a chance to beat them," Lemke said. "We have to worry about our league first before we start thinking about the Thunderchickens."
