We wholeheartedly agree with the plans for renovation; however, we would like to point out that a more pressing problem has arisen due to the proposed budget reallocation.

You mentioned in your editorial that some displays have been removed to Nebraska Hall for protection. Most people do not realize that all the displays we see at Morrill Hall are first prepared and studied at Nebraska Hall. In fact the fossil mammal collections at Nebraska Hall far exceed those on display at Morrill Hall. If the proposed 25 percent cut in state museum research funding goes into effect, the future ability of the museum to carry on its outstanding work will be put into serious

Calling U.S. intervention in Lebanon "an unclear mission," Jackson nevertheless maintained the need for some sort of modified peacekeeping force in that country until the boos from the crowd worked a change — "We need to get our men out of Lebanon immediately. We have no purpose there," he said, to cheers.

It was not the presidential candidate, but a poet who expressed the significance of tens of thousands of people gathered to stop the injustice their government perpetrates. June Jordan, a West Indian poet, said it with sarcasm and a certain kind of joyful confidence: "This is just a fantasy. We
