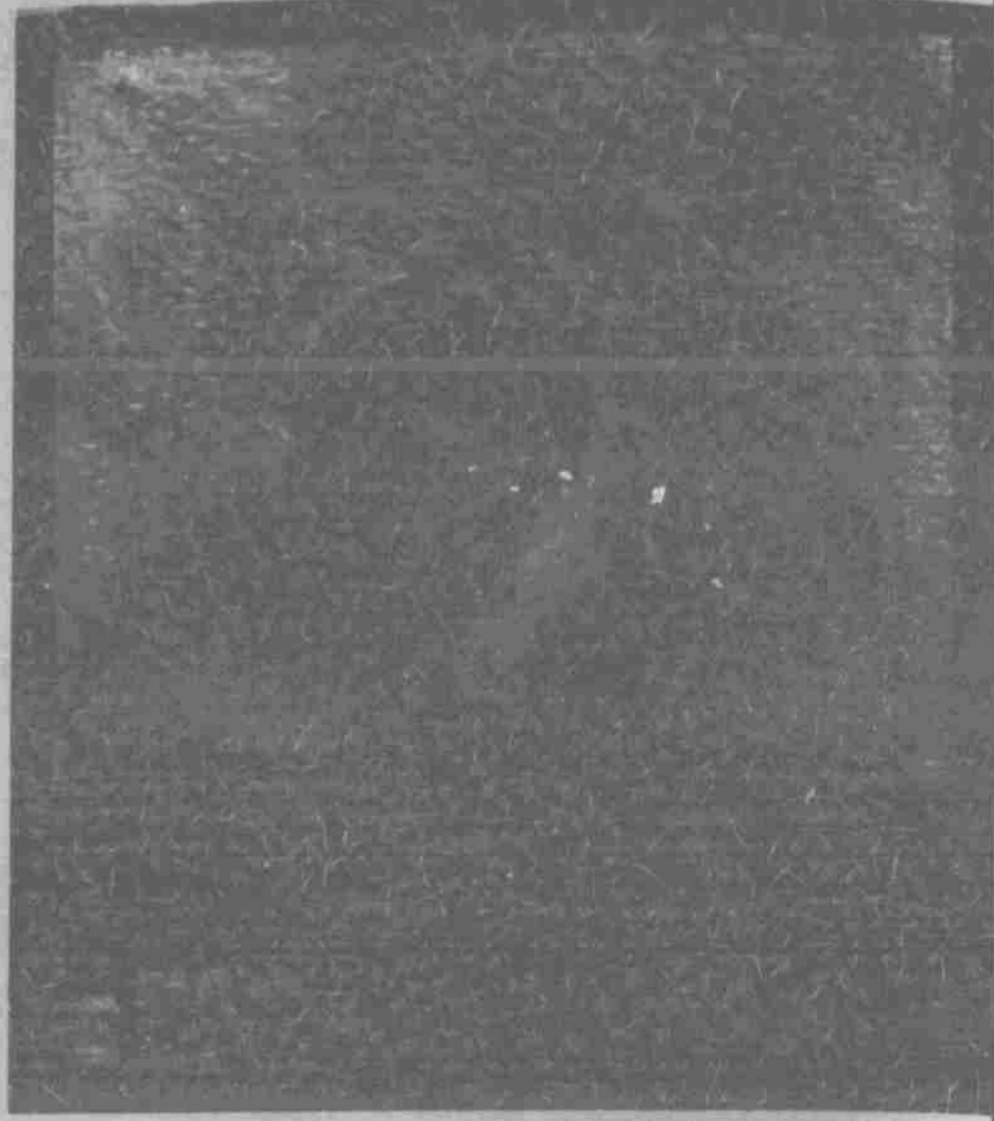

 Fleischli said that while the ordinary common cold cannot be cured, it still can be treated. Building your body up with fluids, vitamins, good nutrition and plenty of rest is the best treatment for a cold and can help prevent one as well, he said.
 People can get symptomatic relief from over-the-counter remedies, but they can have side effects such as drowsiness and a dry throat.
 "Each person is different and must try minimizing misery — trading side effects for symptoms. You have to find a balance between the two," Fleischli said.
 Despite a national epidemic, the health center has not reported many students complaining about influenza. Most suspected cases have turned out to be colds.
 The health center does not recommend students get immunized for influenza unless they have a chronic illness.
 Influenza tends to have a sudden onset. Symptoms often include body aches, a dry cough, irritated eyes, sore throat, a headache and nasal congestion.

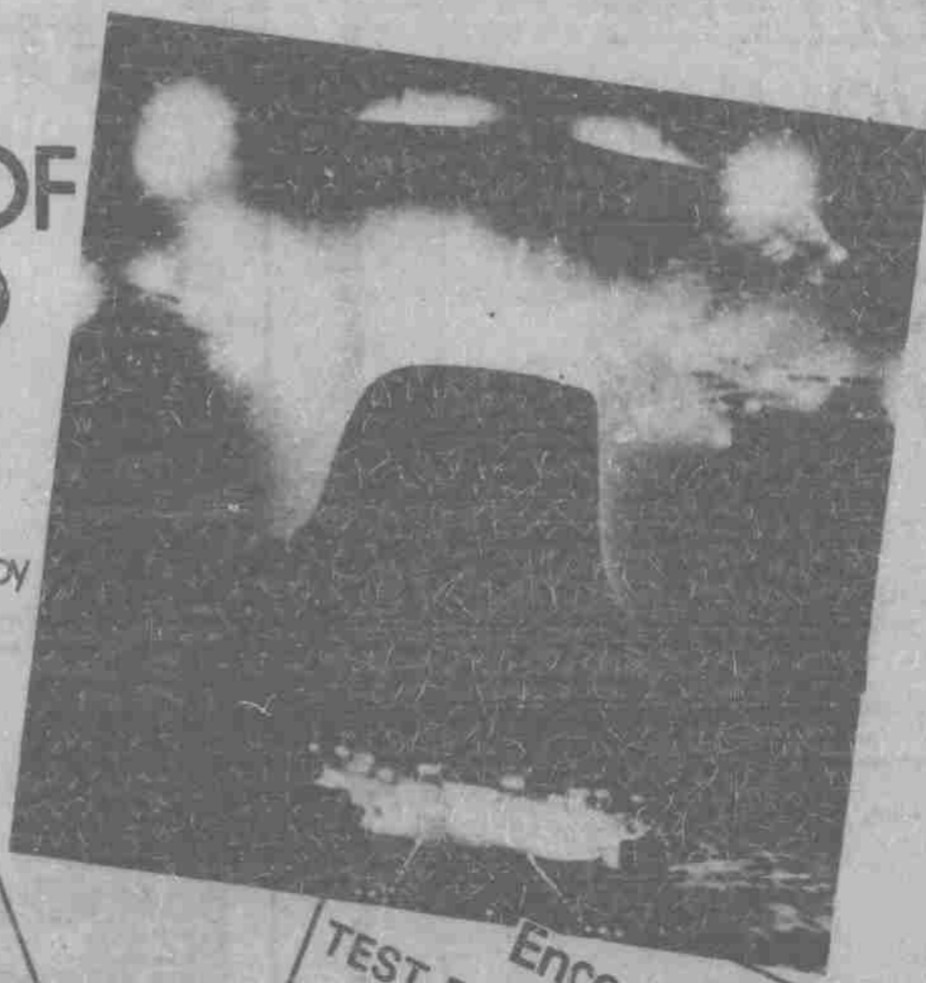

Who's News

The UNL Foundation has received a \$360,000 endowment from the estate of Ida M. Bukey of Lincoln. According to the terms of Bukey's will, proceeds from the Bukey Memorial Fund, expected to be approximately \$30,000 a year, will be used for UNL science graduate fellowships, preferably in the fields of pharmacy, biology or medicine. A University fellowship committee will determine the distribution of the fellowships.

Two graduate students from the UNL Teachers College who earned their doctoral degrees in 1984 have received national recognition for their dissertations.

They are Joan Oftedahl of Westby, Wisc., and Marilyn Harris of Lincoln. Oftedahl received the 1985 Distinguished Award in Teacher Education for her dissertation entitled "Secondary English Methods Courses in the Midwest as Viewed by Methods Professors and Secondary English Teachers." Harris received the Phi Delta Kappa Outstanding Doctoral Dissertation Award for her Secondary School Parents, Teachers, and Building Administrators Regarding the Applications of Computer Technology in the Public Schools.

The award will be presented to Oftedahl at the 65th Annual National Conference in Las Vegas Feb. 21. Harris' work will be one of seven dissertations honored at the Phi Delta Kappa biennial council meeting in Toronto in October 1985.

On Jan. 2, an electrical engineering professor in the College of Engineering and Technology at UNL has been named a fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers.

Eskeial Bahar is the only member of UNL's electrical engineering faculty nominated and selected to become a fellow in the international organization.

Bahar was honored "for contributing to the theory of propagation, scattering, and depolarization of electromagnetic waves," according to the IEEE.
