Squads face key tests at league-leading OU

Nebraska men's and women's basketball coaches Moe Iba and Kelly Hill expressed concern about rebounding, shot selection and patience as their teams prepared to travel to Norman, Okla., to face the Sooners.

Iba, who spoke at the weekly press luncheon on Monday, said the Sooners "have a lot of offensive tools" and are relying on other players besides All-American Wayman Tisdale for scoring.

"They're not depending on Tisdale for everything," Iba said. "They've got more people involved, and anytime you have more people involved, you seem to be better."

One of the players taking the pressure off Tisdale is 6-5 forward Darryl Kennedy, who has averaged 20.2 points per game since the conference season began.

Against Kansas earlier this season, Kennedy exploded for a career-high 35 points when the Jayhawks keyed their defense around Tisdale, who was held to a career-low six points.

Rebounding is another of Tisdale's and Kennedy's strengths. The tandem averages 19 rebounds per game.

"It's unbelievable," Iba said. "They're the type of team that has good shooters, but when they miss their off side rebounders are the type that can dunk over us."

Iba said the Huskers need to concentrate on offensive execution to beat the Sooners, who are 6-0 in the conference and 18-4 overall.

"To beat Oklahoma we have to play smarter than we have all year long," Iba

said. "We have to, in a press or break situation, score on them because that's when they give up a lot of easy goals."

"We also have to be smart enough not to take bad shots," Iba said. "When they get down the floor and get into a half-court game, you have to handle the basketball and take your time. You can't get into a shooting match with Oklahoma."

Junior forward John Matzke, who came off the bench to score 17 points in the Huskers' 91-80 loss to Kansas, will make his first start of the season against the Sooners.

Matzke, a former prep standout at Lincoln High, started 21 games for Nebraska last year before giving way to Ronnie Smith late in the season.

"In practice, he's the best forward we've got at that position," Iba said. "He's been shooting the ball, and he's got confidence."

Hill said Oklahoma's women's team, which leads the conference with a 5-1 record, has a balanced scoring attack.

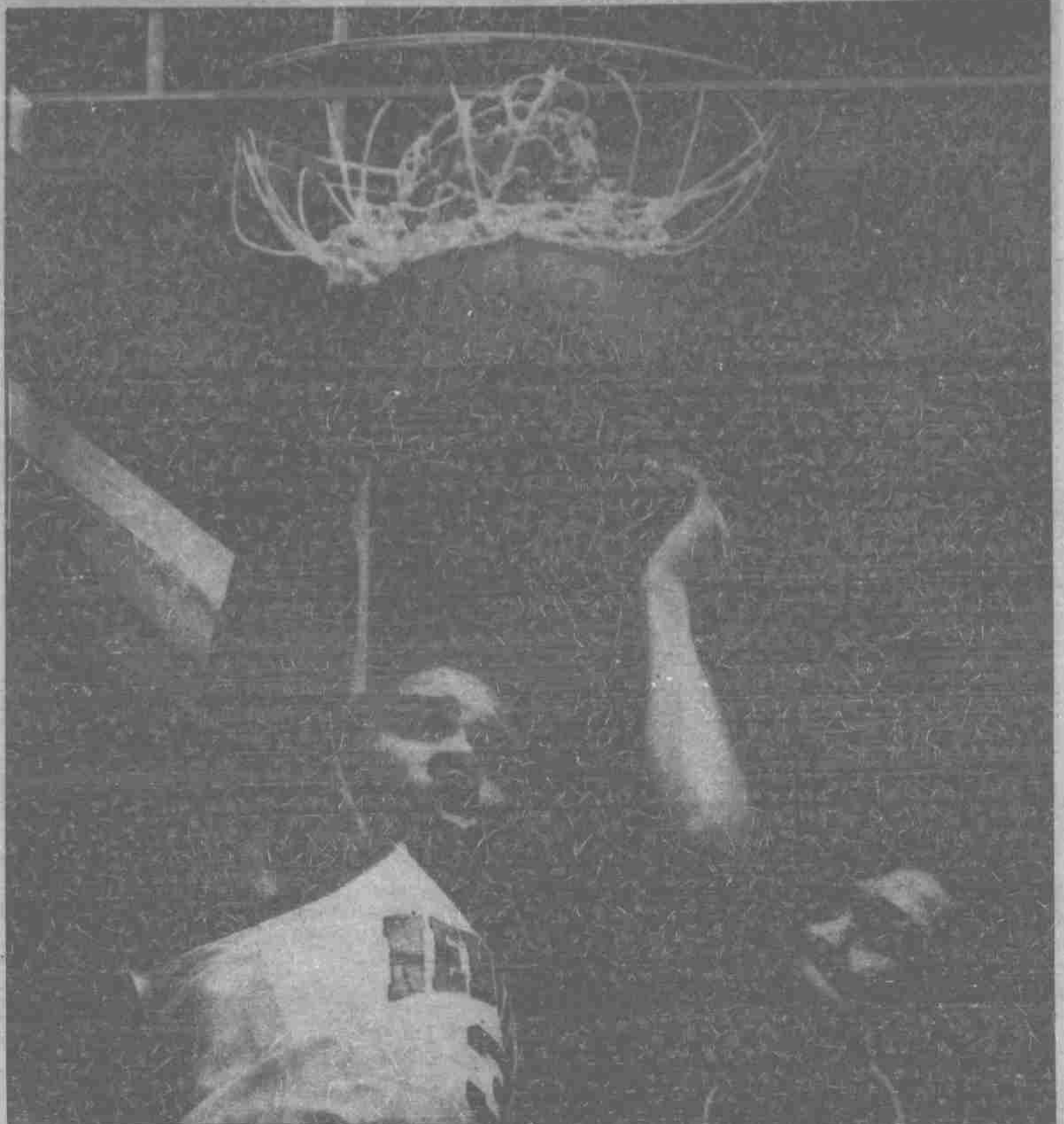
"Oklahoma is a real balanced team," Hill said. "They have four people scoring in double figures and (Jacquetta) Hurley, who is probably their biggest threat, scores around 21 per game."

Speed, Hill said, is the Sooners' outstanding characteristic.

"They have a lot of speed," Hill said. "But they're a streak team. They'll hit two or three in a row and slack off and let you back in the game."

Hill expects the Sooners to use their speed by pressuring the ball.

"They use a lot of full-court pressure," Hill said. "They're a transition team. They like to move up and down the court, just like we do."

Albright injury prevents weekend wrestling wins

Nebraska All-American heavyweight Gary Albright reinjured his shoulder as Nebraska dropped two dual meets on the road last weekend.

Nebraska wrestled without the knockout punch of Albright in both matches, losing Friday night 21-15 to BYU in Provo, Utah, and 24-14 Saturday to Utah State in Logan. Going into the heavyweight match of both duals Nebraska had a chance to win. Albright reinjured

his shoulder in Friday night's match and defaulted. Nebraska forfeited the heavyweight match Saturday.

Nebraska Coach Bob Fehrs said Monday Albright has a chronic shoulder problem that seems to be aching up more severely than in the past. Fehrs said Albright received treatment Sunday and was to see the team doctor Monday. Fehrs said he didn't know whether Albright would be able to compete this Friday at home against North Dakota State.

One other disappointment was fifth-

ranked 118-pounder Matt Campbell's loss Saturday, Fehrs said.

"Matt had some difficulty making weight Saturday and I think because of that, he was not mentally and physically prepared for the match," Fehrs said. The loss "will be detrimental to Matt in terms of his seeding in the Big Eight and national tournaments," Fehrs said.

Nebraska now carries a 6-8 dual record. Fehrs said he expected his team to compete with BYU and Utah State, both unranked.

"We would have, but individual let-downs did not allow us to take ad-

vantage of their weaknesses," Fehrs said.

Several individuals wrestled well, Fehrs said. Freshmen Keenan Turner (150) and Jeff Colivet (158) both recorded two wins over the weekend. The two wins were a continuation of a fine season for Turner, Fehrs said, while Colivet is beginning to show the improvement Fehrs said he expected earlier.

Fehrs said Jake Sabo wrestled at 177 last weekend after having trouble making weight at 167.

Remodeling forces team to relocate

The UNL Intercollegiate bowling team and the Classic Big Eight League have moved their headquarters to Classic Lanes in Lincoln pending changes in the Nebraska Union Recreation.

Advisor Rollie Hughes said the classic league bowls at Classic Lanes because the East Union could not provide space and time for the league. The league provides competitors for the intercollegiate bowling team.

The moves were necessary because of plans to expand the University Bookstore in the Nebraska Union basement. The lanes were closed Monday.

Hughes said Bowling Trades Inc. of Fridley, Minn., bought the bowling equipment for \$14,500 and should have the equipment picked up and moved by Thursday.

The Nebraska bowling team was ranked sixth in the nation in last month's ratings. The team has since beaten three of the top five in a Las Vegas tournament.
