
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Daily Nebraskan **UNL** Chancellor Massengale directs football association

UNL Chancellor Dr. Martin A. Massengale was elected president of the College Football Association last week in Dallas.

Massengale said he was pleased with the election, but preferred a modest approach in speculating about why he was elected to the post.

"I think it is recognition of the University of Nebraska and our fine athletic program," Massengale said. "We have a good academic and athletic reputation nationwide, and that's why I think I was elected - not because of me individually."

Massengale has been involved with the CFA for several years, after being appointed by the Big Eight to represent the conference in the 66-member association.

Massengale said he does not expect his job as president to be overly time consuming.

"Most of the work will still be done like to see the association get stronger. by the staff office in Boulder," Massengale said. "I'll just be setting some policy and direction for the association."

The CFA is made up of three subgroups: coaches, faculty representatives, and athletic directors. Massengale noted that the CFA makes proposals, but the NCAA has the final say on the CFA's proposals.

"The CFA is not an enforcement agency," Massengale said. "We make recommendations to the NCAA, work with television contracts, and try to promote the general welfare of college football throughout the nation."

Massengale stressed that the association deals not only with athletics, but academics as well.

"We want to work on behalf of academics in order to develop the total individual," Massengale said. "That's what we're after. I have a large interest in academics and that's probably why I'm serving as president."

The CFA is headed in the right direction, Massengale said, but he would to get involved."

"I think the CFA is growing in stature and improving overall, but I'd like to see it (CFA) establish its own position," Massengale said. "I'd like to see an increase in the stability of the member institutions and the assistance to their programs."

Massengale said it is possible that his election along with Nebraska's quality academic and football programs might help to bring more visibility to the state and to the school.

Massengale's election as CFA president comes exactly five years after being named chancellor of the University of Nebraska. Massengale will serve a three-year term, replacing University of Kentucky President Otis Singletary. who had served as president since 1983. Massengale's term as president became effective June 1.

"I have plenty of things to keep me busy now," Massengale said. "But as long as I can be of some use, I'm willing
