Atlantic Records.

AC/DC fans, this one's for you. Here is yet another album to come from this long-lived band, and believe me, it's no slouch. This album has three new songs from AC/DC plus some great classics, and it's the official soundtrack for the new Stephen King movie, "Maximum Overdrive."

The title track, "Who Made Who" is a song that has been popularized by the radio, and rightly so as this song belongs up there with the other AC/DC greats. It's perhaps not as fast-paced or hard-rocking as some AC/DC songs, but it is still well made and well performed, with Scott Johnson's strong vocals and Angus Young, with his English schoolboy outfit and custom guitar, right behind him.

In addition to "Who Made Who," the other new songs on this album are, "Chase the Ace" and "DT." Both of these are instrumentals. "Chase the Ace" is the faster and better sounding of the two, due to a fine lead guitar solo by Young.

Now for the classics. This new album includes some of the best AC/DC songs ever with, "You Shook Me All Night Long," "Hells Bells," "For Those About to Rock," and "Shake Your Foundations" leading the list. Also included are "Sink the Pink" and the late Bon Scott's "Ride On."

If you are an AC/DC fan but don't have all of the albums, this one is for you. It combines some of the best previously recorded songs along with three new ones that are destined to

be as great as the established AC/DC hits.
