Meanwhile, on a grim note, Bottom Ten selectors admitted that they had mistakenly voted UCLA No. 1 last week based on Oklahoma linebacker Brian Bosworth's statements that the Bruins (0-1) were a "legitimate doormat," and played "girls football."

When Bosworth explained a few days later that he was only kidding, the rankings already had been published. The selectors wish to apologize to the No. 2 Bruins, their friends and family members and any potential high school recruits (male or female) who might have been misled.

Pennsylvania (0-4), meanwhile, remains winless. But say this for Philadelphia coach Buddy Ryan. The defensive genius has proved adept at handcuffing the Eagles' offense (24 points in two games).

At least Miami of Florida regained a shred of dignity. The Dolphin Defenders, nicknamed Miami Mice! After surrendering 50 points to San Diego in the opener, held Indianapolis to 10 Sunday. On the other hand, that's more than three times as much as the No. 4 Colts scored in their opener.

Elsewhere, Ram QB No. 5,124, Steve Bartkowski, derided by some as Lemon Tree Bart after completing 14 of 41 passes for 145 yards in his first seven quarters of work, woke up briefly to march Los Angeles past No. 6 San Francisco.

He said the Huskers have the toughest fall schedule that they've ever had.

"I'm not worried about the schedule because we have the best pitching staff in the nation," Wolforth said. "We can lose one of the pitchers and still have an effective staff with the other two."

Last year the Husker pitching staff had a combined earned run average of .68 and had 342 strikeouts.

All-American Lori Sippel led the Huskers with 181 strikeouts and an earned run average of .37. Sophomore Marlys Handley turned in a solid performance with a .36 ERA and a 13-2 record.

Wolforth said he thinks he has the best second baseman in the country with Lori Richins, a senior from Chico, Calif. Richins batted a .308 last year and was an All-American selection.

As for the offense, Wolforth said he has great offensive power on his team. Junior Margie Ogradowicz last year batted .349 and led the team in runs scored with 34. Nebraska has 12 hitters on the team, "which means if somebody isn't hitting I can put somebody

in that can do the job," Wolforth said.

The first tournament of the season should be a real test for the Huskers, Wolforth said. Kansas, last year's runner-up to Nebraska in the Big Eight Tournament, should give the Huskers a

tough time.

Iowa State and Illinois State also will be formidable opponents for the Huskers. Last year in the Big Eight Tournament, Iowa State took the Huskers to eight innings before finally losing 201. Last year Nebraska defeated Illinois State 8-0 in the Fall Classic.

"All of the teams we are playing this weekend are improved teams," Wolforth said. "Kearney State is scrappy and always plays us tough. Kansas is our biggest rivalry in the conference. Iowa State is a much-improved team and Illinois State always gives us a good game."

Not being able to play in the College World Series last year motivated the team, Wolforth said. The team is hungry this year, and doesn't plan to embarrass itself this season, he said.

"This fall will prepare the team for the Big Eight Conference race in the spring which will be very tough since Kansas State dropped its program," Wolforth said.

This is Wolforth's first year as a coach on the college level. He coached for one year at Tarkington High School in Texas where his team tied for the district championship. He is joined by first-year assistant Rick Church, who will handle the physical conditioning of the team.

"This job is a dream come true for me since I grew up in Nebraska. I hope I can continue to bring success to Nebraska softball like it's team in the past," Wolforth said.

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
